The Maritime Baptist refers in a recent issue in a flattering manner to Mr. Hinson, formerly a pastor of the Prince Street, Baptist Church in this City. Mr. Hinson is well known to Maritime Baptists for his long and successful pastorate at Moncton and is a remarkable preacher, orator and scholar and his personality is unique. His highest ambition seems to be to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ with Holy Ghost power. Mr. Hinson is a man of splendid physique. The tall slim man of one hundred and forty-five pounds known to Charlottetown is now a man of nearly two hundred pounds.

Prof. Ruddick Assistant Dairy Commissioner for Canada, says in part of his report on Dairying in the Maritime Provinces: The dairy industry is not making much progress in the Maritime Provinces. The number of factories remains about the same in Prince Edward Island as for several years past. The production of cheese and butter during the season of 1906 showed some increase over the previous year and there is evidence that the herds are recovering from the effects of the unfavorable season in 1905. At present there seems to be some revival of interest in dairying in the island province. The dairy industry in the province of Nova Scotia is rather declining instead of growing. There were 33 cheese and butter factories in 1900 and only 17 in 1906, the quantity of milk received in the latter year being about one-third of what it was in 1900. Dairying shows more progress in New Brunswick. While the number of establishments for the manufacture of butter and cheese has not increased during the past 6 years, the value of the products has increased considerably. The dairy industry in New Brunswick is assisted and encouraged by expert advisers employed by the provincial Department of Agriculture. The manufacture of condensed milk is reported to be prosperous in Canada and shows signs of growth and development. There are only four or five establishments in operation, but several others are projected.

The big hockey match in the Arena tonight between the Crystals and Victorias will decide the winners of the trophy and Island championship. In the senior game the Victorias have one goal to their credit while the intermediate teams are on an equal footing as their last game in Summerside ended in a draw. These will be most interesting games and well worth seeing.

In the necessarily brief reports of the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly that have appeared in The Guardian, the remarks of Hon. Geo. E. Hughes regarding exhibitions, made in his speech in the debate on the address were not given as fully as they should have been to make his position in the matter plain. He said that, in the event of failing to have a central board of commissioners appointed on which Queen's King's and Prince Counties would be well represented, he would favor a central provincial exhibition being held each year at Charlottetown, and every alternate year an exhibition at Summerside and Georgetown. Thus every year there would be a Provincial exhibition in Charlottetown and a county exhibition in either Prince or King's county as well.

The third series of Court Abegweit entertainments was held at the home of Bro. T. F. Drake on Tuesday evening 3rd inst. The committee of management having decided to hold the social semi monthly (that a month is too long to wait for a good thing) and until further notice they will be held as above.
