There will be no deviation from this rule and the Park Keeper has been instructed to see that the law is obeyed in this respect. He has no choice in the matter only to hand in the names of offenders. The City Council is absolutely determined that this beautiful park shall be made safe for women and children. In nearly all cities cars are not allowed in any portion of parks, so that the Council feel they have made reasonable concessions in granting the portion open as far as the Band Stand.

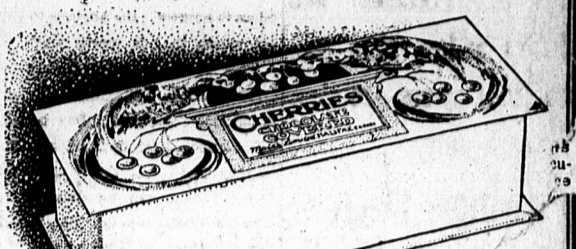
