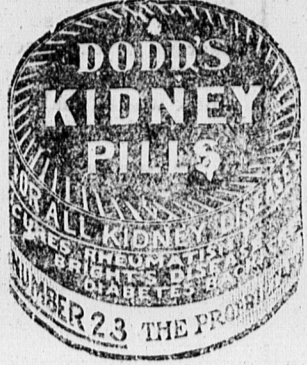
...The latest news, first of all.

By means of charts showing all the different pests which infest fruit trees, Mr. Peters explained the habits of these insects, showing that many, such as the oyster-shell bark louse, apple aphid, canker worm, etc., can be controlled by use of the lime sulphur solution.

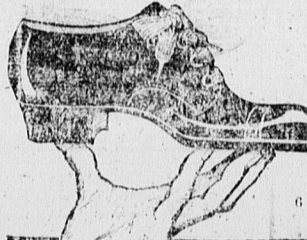

### Synopsis of Canadian North west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family of any male over 18 years old, who has been a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for Subsidized entry for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by his mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending home Stead.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on an arm of at least 3/4 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter-section along with his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead entry. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$2000.

thus have six hours daily in this city, and between Cape Traverse and intervening points seven and a half hours. And nothing short of the privilege of at least six hours daily in this city will ever be satisfactory to the people along the railway line between Summerside and Charlottetown. The Guardian does not see that there can be any valid reason that the above changes cannot be made at once with the present but temporary timetable, and the Cape Traverse train be included in regular schedule on definite hours, instead of irregular as at present, between Emerald and this city. The Guardian further does not see why the changes enumerated should call for any extra expenditure whatever, but instead that they would be a source of extra revenue from many persons who would find it so convenient to travel by the above trains to and from this city rather than use their horses and carriages as at present, for it is well known that when people get the service they want they will readily patronize it more and more.

Superintendent Sharp has done much for the Prince Edward Island Railway during his term of office, for which he deserves much credit. The rolling stock has been greatly improved and is now quite modern. It is worthy of note that the tracks are well patrolled, there being scarcely ever an accident, although the road is certainly not without its artistic curves and consequent greater danger. Many new stations and freight houses have been erected, including those in several leading business centres, and the up-to-date new depot and works in this city. During Mr. Sharp's regime the Montague and

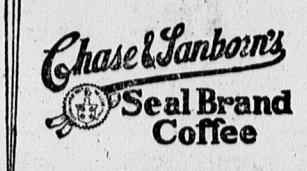
