

SALARY GRAFT NOW DEFENDED

FITZGERALD AND FROTHINGHAM

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 16.—At the joint primaries held today throughout the city for the choice of candidates for mayor and other municipal offices, former Congressman John F. Fitzgerald received the democratic nomination over City Clerk Edward J. Donovan, by a plurality of 3,915 votes, while Louis A. Frothingham, speaker of the Massachusetts house of representatives, was the choice of the republicans by a plurality of 275 over Judge Henry S. Dewey.

A PRAIRIE FIRE SWEEPS DAKOTA

BONESTEE, S. D., Nov. 16.—Two children are missing and many square miles of farm land have been ravaged as the result of a prairie fire that has raged for two days, threatening for a time to attack Aberdeen S. D., and the newly opened Rosebud Indian reservation lands. Many cattle have perished and a score of farmbuildings have been burned in spite of the three hundred farmers who are fighting the flames night and day. John L. Brining's farm was devastated and his two daughters, aged six and eight years, are reported lost. They were at school when the fire swept the region.

A DEMAND OF ASSIGNMENT

QUEBEC, Nov. 16.—Carrier, Laine & Co., one of Canada's most prominent manufacturing establishments, with headquarters at Levis, is in financial difficulties and a demand of assignment was made upon the firm by the Bank of Montreal, whose claim amounts to \$160,000. The firm is one of the oldest in the province and has always employed several hundred hands at their extensive works in Levis.

CHIEF OF POLICE INTENDED VICTIM

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 16.—Fehan Pasha, the chief of the secret police of the palace was intended to be the victim of yesterday's bomb outrage. The Pasha however escaped unscathed and the explosion did little damage. The bomb was thrown from the roof of a house on the main road of the Pera quarter as Fehan was passing in a carriage. The attempt on his life is attributed to the Armenians as an Armenian was discovered in the house from which the bomb was thrown.

COAL ADVANCES FIFTY CENTS

The Regular Winter Advance is Later This Year Than Usual.

BOSTON, Nov. 17.—(Special)—Coal today advanced in priced fifty cents per ton in all grades except furnace and pea, which advanced twenty-five cents. This is only the regular winter increase which had this year been delayed longer than usual.

AN AMERICAN'S SWIMMING FEAT

SAN FRANCISCO, November 16, A letter from Cairo, Egypt, gives details of the swimming of the Nile from Old Cairo to Basus, 11 1/4 miles by George W. Poss, a San Francisco engineer, now in charge of the Egyptian Cotton Mills at Cairo. He had heard that the swimming of the river below the bridge was regarded as impossible, but he swam the distance mentioned, accompanied part of the way by Joseph De Sents, a cotton mill employe, in a boat. A strong wind was blowing and the man in the boat found it impossible to keep pace with the swimmer. He kept in sight of Poss, however, until near the end of the long swim. The Arabs were amazed at the strength and endurance of the American swimmer.

STRONG LANGUAGE AGAINST AUTOISTS

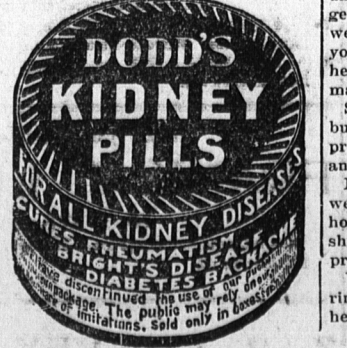
CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—The Rev. Father P. J. McDonnell, of St. Mel's Roman Catholic Church, ended an appeal for the most stringent action against "Automobile criminals," made to the West Park Board yesterday by declaring that a man would be justified in killing the "Criminal autoist who would crush out his life." Father McDonnell's appeal was made when he headed a delegation of Church members, property owners and aldermen, who appeared before the Park Board and presented a petition in which demands were made that radical action be taken against autoists.

"That is a strong doctrine to preach, but radical action is needed in dealing with these criminals," said Father McDonnell. "We are here to say that there is a power in this community which is not dependent on mere suffrage and that is every man's right to act in self defence."

CHINA'S EMPEROR IS A PRISONER

VICTORIA, Nov. 15.—Advices from Peking, published by Japanese vernacular papers received by the Empress of China, state that when the Dowager Empress of China returned hastily from her summer palace because of bomb outrages in Peking, she summoned the Emperor and asked what he knew of the outrages, whereupon the Emperor showed much confusion. At a signal from the Empress a party of guards appeared and led the Emperor to a hall, where he has since been confined, no one having access to him and food being thrust in through a window. The Machi Shihun says the Emperor occasionally raises shrieks, like those of a lunatic.

BIG AND SWIFT NEW STEAMERS

Twenty Knots Speed and of Twenty Thousand Tons Building for C.P.R.

GLASGOW, SCOTLAND, Nov. 17.—(Special)—The first of the new passenger steamers built for the Canadian Pacific Railway has been successfully launched from the Fairfield works here. The new liner, the Empress of Britain, will make her first trip to Montreal in May next.

She is the largest vessel ever launched from the Fairfield yards having a displacement of twenty thousand tons and ranking as one of the biggest steamers on the North Atlantic. Her sister ship, the Empress of Ireland, will be launched in January. These steamers will have a speed of twenty knots and will make the run from Montreal to Liverpool in six days.

THE MONCTON SHOOTING CASE

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 16.—The investigation in the shooting case re-commenced this afternoon. The dead boy's father was on the stand till adjournment, but nothing was elicited. Howarth repeating his story, saying he always thought the shooting intentional but had not taken action because pressed not to do so, and being told he could do nothing. He said after the shooting Blackwood started towards town, but witness threatened to shoot him unless he came back. The investigation will be continued tomorrow, when it is said some rather important evidence may be given.

Miss Green came to St. Louis three weeks ago and stopped at the boarding house of Mrs. Elizabeth Strebeck, where she met Statham. He lost no time in prosecuting his suit for her hand. Word that she had a suitor got to Herring at his home in Memphis, and he came here and persuaded the girl to marry him

NEW CARDINALS TO BE CHOSEN

Five Will be Named at Next Consistory Held in Rome December 11.

ROME, Nov. 17.—(Special).—Five new Cardinals will be created at the Consistory of December eleventh. These are Cagano de Agedo, Major Domo of the Vatican; Archbishop Cavalcanti de Albuquerque of Rio Janeiro; Archbishop Spinola of Seville; Archbishop Samasa of Hungary and Monsignor Cavallari, Patriarch of Venice.

CRAWFORD AND HOWARD CONFESS

BOSTON, Nov. 16.—Louis A. Crawford and Wm. E. Howard, charged with complicity in the death of Susanna A. Geary, whose body was dismembered and thrown in dress suit cases into the harbor, were brought here tonight from New York by Superintendent of Police Pierce and Chief Detective Watts.

During the trip from New York, Crawford and Howard made a complete statement of their knowledge of the case to the officers, making clear some of the difficulties that surrounded the affair. Both men were taken to police headquarters and were later placed in the Charles street jail. In the morning they will be arraigned in court on the charge of being accessory before and after the crime. Chief Watts said tonight that bail would probably be fixed at \$20,000 each.

CURZON EXPLAINS WHY HE RESIGNED

BOMBAY, India, Nov. 16.—At a banquet given in his honor here today, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, the retiring viceroy of India, made a frank avowal of the reasons for his resignation. Beginning with the declaration that he considered the office of viceroy the noblest in the gift of the British nation and that it ought to be looked upon as a prize to be awarded only to its greatest statesman, he said it could not be supposed that he would without the strongest reasons resign a position which had been the dream of his childhood and the ambition of his manhood. He resigned, he said, on no personal grounds but in defense of two great principles—first, that there should be an indestructible subordination of the military to the civil authority; and second, the necessity of paying becoming regard to the Indian authority in determining the needs of India. Lord Curzon contended that in sacrificing himself in defence of these principles he had the great preponderance of Indian opinion behind him, and predicted that should the day ever come when the Viceroy would be treated as the mere puppet of the home government, the justification for the post would cease to exist. He said he did not believe that the administrative wisdom of his countrymen would ever tolerate such a blunder.

MARTIAL LAW TO BE PROCLAIMED

In St. Petersburg Today Against Premier Witte's Wishes—Alarming Situation—Prince Charles Offered the Throne Of Denmark.

The formal offer of the throne to His Highness will now be made.

SHOT BROTHER THEN HIMSELF

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 16.—Fritz Jaftz, 20 years of age, a real-estate dealer last night shot his brother Ludwig, 22 years of age, twice through the head and once through the heart, instantly killing him and then fired a bullet through his own temple dying on the spot. Fritz left a note addressed to his father saying that he had killed his brother and taken his own life because he believed the two were a burden to their father and better off dead.

BOSTON'S JEROME HITS B G HOTELS

BOSTON, Nov. 16.—J. Reid Whipple, proprietor of Young's Parker's and the Touraine, declared today that the Touraine would have to be closed if Mr. Moran, the district attorney-elect, made it impossible for liquor to be served to guests of the house. The Touraine has no liquor licence, because it is within 400 feet of a school house, but under a license nominally held by John Coleman, in the rear of the place, guests are served on an order system by which the waiters are supposed to become the agent of the patron. Mr. Moran decides this to be a fiction which will not stand legal test and has declared he will prosecute in this case. Mr. Whipple said today: "Unless in some way liquor can be served to my patrons the Touraine will have to be closed. It is very hard now days to run a good hotel in Boston. And if things get worse it will be impossible to entertain guests well; they will no longer stop over in Boston, and people will cry about our lack of enterprise. The hotels are severely handicapped, whereas clubs are allowed to do anything. "On account of Mr. Moran's remarks I have had the lower curtains in the Parker House barroom removed, and also the stained glass screen in Young's that was put there for ornamental purposes twenty-five ago. "The next session of the legislature will be asked to make some changes in regard to the liquor laws, especially those relating to hotels and to the statute which compels barrooms to close at 11 o'clock at night."

BOYS KILLED IN SAVING A GIRL

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Kingston Bauvell, age 6, and Abraham Diamond, aged 5, of Jamaica, L. I. lost their lives today in saving the life of a little girl who was in danger of being run down by a railway train at a crossing. To save her the Bauvells and Diamond boys rushed forward and shoved her across the track and to safety but there was not time for them to cross or re-un and they fell beneath the wheels. They were taken to a hospital where they died a few hours later.

ALEXANDER MOWAT, fishery expert, who has been superintending the work of collecting the eggs from the salmon at the Carleton pond, left last evening for his home in Campbellton. The operations at the Carleton pond have been much more successful than was at one time anticipated. Between six and seven millions of ova have been collected and distributed among the various hatcheries in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec. There have been several new hatcheries opened in the Dominion during the past year, and there are now about twenty-seven in operation in the Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific. All the hatcheries are well filled with the various kinds of eggs and fishes. Fish culture was now conducted under the superintendence of F. H. Cunningham of Ottawa, is in a most healthy condition. Alex. Finlayson, inspector of hatcheries, is in the city from Charlottetown, where he has opened a new hatchery. He is on a tour of inspection and will visit all the hatcheries in the province.—St. John Sun.
