Latest News of the City and Province.

The poultry fattening station will receive chickens to-day and to-morrow.

The chicken fattened at the Charlottetown station have been killed under the supervision of Mr. Hare. Shipment will be made as soon as the shipments from the outlying factories are sent in.

To-morrow Mr. Aubrey Brown will enter upon his duties as stamp vendor in the Post Office. Mr. R. Mason who has been the efficient holder of the office for past 11 years retires and will conduct a business in the shop recently occupied by Morris & Jost.

Dr. and Mrs Taylor have presented the First Methodist choir with the music and words of two magnificent anthems entitled "I will sing of Thy Power" by Sir A. Sullivan, and "Glori Patri," by J. Barnby. Mrs. Taylor scoured the music while in Montreal. Residents of Charlottetown will have the pleasure of hearing the music at a sacred concert to be held in the near future by the Methodist church choir in aid of the Hospital Fund.

It is interesting to learn that the P. E. I. oysters shipped to the Paris Exposition by Mr. Kempf and which took highest award were selected chiefly from Mr. John Richards' beds in the Narrows. These beds were formerly owned by Judge Pope, but since coming into the possession of Mr. Richards they have been enlarged and improved. Narrows oysters have a reputation throughout Canada for their excellent flavor and their high standing at the Paris Exposition will add to their already good name.

TO-DAY Rev. A. C. Shaw leaves Dundas for Tusket, N. S., where he will enter upon his duties as pastor of the Baptist church. During his pastorate in Dundas he has gained many friends, and not only will he be greatly missed by his own congregation, but also by other denominations. On Tuesday evening, Nov 6th, a birthday party was held in Bridgetown Hall, at which a goodly number were present. After an excellent supper had been served by the ladies of the Baptist church, an address and purse were presented to Rev. Mr. Shaw by his Dundas friends. The reverend gentleman replied very appropriately.

The problem of removing the dead and wounded from the firing zone when a battle is still under way, is one that calls forth the best that man possesses. Residents of this province possibly are not aware of the fact that during the first evening of the battle of Paardeberg the noble heroes of P.E. Island, when volunteers were asked for, offered and were accepted by Major Pellittier to go and carry out this perilous action. The men of No. 1 section of G. company were composed of Island men. The boys were anxious knowing that Taylor was among the fallen. Those talked with state that the men apparently were fearless, notwithstanding the impression the Boers were trying to make. On the day when Harris received the wound in the arm, Private Small carried him to the rear and returned to the firing line. Private Lord on another occasion gathered and refilled the water bottles of a number of the men distributing the same at a time when the Boers were particularly desirous that their enemy should feel uncomfortable.

LAUREN MACDONALD, of Souris, hanged himself in his barn, about 5 o'clock Friday evening. He was about 75 years of age, and was always a sober, quiet and industrious man, till the last few days when the occurrence of many troubles prompted him to take the dreadful step of ending his life. A jury was empanelled and a verdict of death by suicide was returned.

MESSRS. MOORE and McLeod's window was the centre of attraction on Saturday evening, everybody wishing to secure a glimpse of the treasures brought home by the boys from South Africa. Among the souvenirs shown are a full set of the Transvaal coins secured by Sapper Fred. Furze and include a penny, three penny piece, sixpence, shilling, two shilling, two and a half shilling, five shilling, half sovereign, and sovereign, all showing ex-President Kruger in base relief. One of those coins is worth \$100. There is also shown a much battered cornet on which is engraved the name "C. Moeller, Bloemfontein." The cornet was picked up by Furze and is said to be one of the instruments of Kruger's band. A twig from a tree growing on Table Mountain, also secured by Furze, is another of the souvenirs displayed. Two beautiful Angola goat skins, a leopard skin and ostrich eggs, collected by Lorne Stewart are also shown.

AS HALIFAX SEES THEM.—Haligonians appreciated the Biograph as the following clipping from the Herald will prove: Speaking of the pictures themselves, those that especially appealed to the people of Halifax are the views of the "Departure of the Strathcona's horse," and new views of the departure of the second contingent. While the war pictures previously seen were mostly those of the regiments, "Marching to war," or on parade in "the piping times of peace," the pictures now being shown are those of actual battles which have taken place since the Canadian soldiers left for the front, and in some of which they have been engaged. Especially to be mentioned is the magnificent scene of the battle of Spion Kop, which shows with startling realism the British firing line, the grouping of the reserves, and the ambulances and stretcher bearers bringing in the wounded. Another war picture, which is weird and almost horrible in its effect, is dropping lyddite shells into the Boer line, when the audience fairly shuddered at the havoc wrought by the deadly missiles.
