BACK STRETCH

We had an item in last week's two Alcantara mares brought here by Benjamin Hearts. These were trained at the Charlottetown Driving Park track by Jimmie Houghton and one of them was raced but with very little success. A daughter, Nettie G., started in a two-year-old stake in 1930 and got a piece of it.

Jimmie Houghton came to Prince Edward Island in 1907 with Parkside and Ballston, two stallions from the Leland Stanford Farm, Palo Alto, California, that were purchased at the Old Glory Sale that fall by W. A. Brennan of the Sunnyside Agricultural Parkside started as a two year old and continued racing for several years with success. He was one of the most valuable contributions to the harness horse breed that has ever come to this Province.

The Doctor was in to see us the other evening and in a reminiscent mood recalled a trainer of bye gone days by the name of Harry Horne, who in the early nineties trained monstrosities out of us and drove Brighton Boy, a yearling, a half-mile to high wheel sulky in 1:28. That was then considered a phenomenal performance. The Doctor says Harry Horne could get speed of anything, or rather that he could make any horse beat three minutes.

He had a query regarding Colonel Aubrey's exhibition mile of 2:10 3-4 and asked us for particulars which we readily recalled from memory. It was a cold, windy afternoon in early October, 1924 when the trial was made. It had been announced in the Guardian of the previous day and there were quite a crowd of horsemen present. Timing was done by hand. Arthur, Russell Abbott, Peter Conroy, Fred Cameron and a lot of other watches among the spectators on the grand stand.

The first mile was paced around nineteen. The second mile with Bud Hal 2:04, in 2:12, the Colonel winning easily. In the third mile Colonel Aubrey went to the quarter in 30 3-4 seconds, the half in 1:04 and the mile in 2:10 3-4.
