of the economic ends required for our economic health.

"When the currencies of those great nations of the continent of Europe, France, Italy and Belgium—depreciated over a period of years, there was no criticism from us, nor did we criticize their ultimate devaluation.

"And when Great Britain and the Scandinavian countries went off the gold standard there was only sympathetic understanding in the United States.

"Great Britain has been off the gold standard for nearly a year and three-quarters, and the United States has been off for less than three months.

Opproves Canada -Austria Trade Agreement

OTTAWA, July 5.—An Order-in-Council formally approving the new trade agreement between Canada and Austria was signed today, and is along the lines forecast yesterday until Dec. 31, 1933, the normal or manufactured products originating in and coming from Austria shall enjoy the intermediate Canadian tariff rate, in return for which the Austrian Government will accord to Canadian products of a like nature, the most favored nation treatment.

In order to secure the advantage of the intermediate tariff Austrian goods must be conveyed, without trans-shipment from Austria, or from a port of a country enjoying the British preferential or intermediate tariff, into a sea, lake or river port of Canada.

Goodyear Pays July Dividends

Improvement Shown in the Last Quarter, Says President Carlisle

Dividends on the Preferred and Common stocks of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Canada, Limited, for the second quarter of 1933, amounting to \$1.75 per share on the Preferred and 60 cents per share on the Common, have been mailed to shareholders.

In a letter accompanying the checks, President C. H. Carlisle states that the dividends of the first half year have been earned on both Preferred and Common stocks and a considerable amount has been added to surplus. Inventory of finished goods is quite satisfactory and conservative, and plant and equipment are carried at a very conservative amount. Purchases of cotton and crude rubber shows a profit, at present prices, of well over half a million dollars, which is not included in the six months' earnings.

Reserves were set up during the half year at the same rate as in previous years. The total reserve account stands at \$6,639,000; current assets at \$10,452,000.00; investments in cash and Government Bonds total \$6,400,000.00 and miscellaneous investments \$221,500.00. Surplus account stands at approximately \$7,392,000.00.

Since the first of the fiscal year the Company has redeemed 135 shares of Preferred stock under sinking fund provisions, making a total of 7,025 redeemed to date. Prior to the current fiscal year 4,670 shares of the present issue of Common stock had been cancelled. During the half year, \$325,000.00 of the bonds issued by the Cotton Company were bought. This is not shown in the investments. Out of the \$2,000,000.00 bond issues of the Cotton Plant there are now outstanding in the hands of the public bonds to the par value of \$999,500.00.

Reviewing business conditions, Mr. Carlisle's letter continues:

"There recently has been an increase in activity of Canadian business as well as a greater demand for labor. Prices have advanced. However, the price advance has not been so marked when you make the comparison with gold.

"Most nations have and are suggesting remedies to combat the depression. This is especially true of the United States. No Congress in the history of the United States has adopted such unusual methods or plans that so completely defy all efforts to estimate their effects. The major world problems remain unsolved, i.e., stabilization of currency, international trading and international debt settlement.

"Your Company," concludes Mr. Carlisle, "will continue its conservative policy as to its investments and at the same time take full advantage of its opportunities."

"It is not sufficient to escape from present evils, but it is our duty to consider together how to avoid a recurrence in the future.

Must Restore Prices

"The first task is to restore prices to a level at which industry and above all, agriculture, can function profitably and efficiently.

"The second task is to preserve the stability of this adjustment, once achieved.

"The part which gold and silver should play after adjustment has been secured would seek a further subject suitable for consideration by the Conference.

"We conceive, therefore, that the great problems which justify the assembling of nations are as present today and as deserving of exploration as was the case a few weeks ago; and we find it difficult to conceive that the view which it has been our obvious duty to take on the minor issues of temporary stabilization can in any way diminish the advisability of such discussion."

The annual meeting of the Bible Society was held yesterday in the United Church at Valleyfield, with a representative attendance from each section of the Province.

In the morning there was a meeting of the Executive of the Society.

At the afternoon session devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. D. L. Griffiths. The President, Rev. H. D. Raymond, then took the chair, and welcomed the delegates from the different parishes. He pointed out that the interests of the Bible Society are far-reaching and its roots are very deep. "The entrance of Thy Word giveth Light."

Mr. Raymond then named Rev. G. T. Spriggs as Acting Secretary and Mrs. Earle Prowse and Mr. J. F. Whear as a Press Committee.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the Rev. G. T. Spriggs in the absence of the Secretary, Mr. J. P. Gordon, and were on motion approved.

The balance has since January been reduced by a further draft to the Parent Society.

Rev. Dr. Pringle who was in attendance was called upon by the Chairman and made a few appropriate remarks.

The report of the special committee for the revision of the constitution and by-laws who were appointed at the last annual meeting was submitted and on motion the amendments suggested were adopted.
