The Quebec City Corporation has just passed a bylaw imposing a license fee of \$300 on every commercial traveller who sells goods to "persons other than merchants. That bylaw comes into effect on May 1, and all who violate it will be liable to a fine of \$40 or imprisonment for two months. Of course the travellers seldom sell to others than those who buy to sell again, but none the less they will hardly relish the restrictions and penalties about to be imposed in sleepy old Quebec

In Hungary they are working out the servant girl problem in a manner that is very different from what prevails in the New World. The London Times states that the prefect of Jaszbereny has lately issued the following peculiar decree:

In view of the fact that domestic servants are getting more and more in the habit of neglecting their work in order to amuse themselves, I hereby give notice that any female domestic servant who is found out of doors or even on the doorstep of the house of which she is employed after 9 p. m., will be summarily arrested and punished by four days' imprisonment.

Johannesburg has a new liquor ordinance based on high license. Five hundred dollars is the lowest license fee and under this the holder must close his house at 9 o'clock in the evening. By paying \$1,000 the licensee is permitted to keep open till midnight. There are severe penalties for violation of the license conditions. The holder of license is not permitted to sell more than a pint of beer or a proportionate amount of spirits to any one person. Clubs are heavily taxed and limited also as to hours and quantities of sale. We are no admirers of high license, but it is interesting to learn that in the newest British possessions some progress is making toward restriction of the liquor traffic.

Some years ago the Conservative party in New Brunswick took action at a large convention held in Moncton in favor of conducting provincial affairs on federal party lines. This was done because in the combination system, which has prevailed in the province since confederation, the Conservatives, who were for a good while dominant in the Government, had grown dissatisfied. At the time of the Moncton convention the leading Liberal journals of the Province took strong ground against the proposed return to the party system. The Telegraph, which is undoubtedly the most widely circulated Liberal journal in the sister Province, has now concluded that party lines have become desirable. This has aroused a new controversy, because Premier Tweedie and Attorney General Pugsley, who are leading spirits in the Government, were formerly both prominent Conservatives. Even under the new program some of the straight-line Liberals are apparently unwilling to lend these gentlemen their support. And the general election is now near at hand. It will probably take place before another session of the Legislature is held.
