THRONE SPEECH LAYS EMPHASIS UPON ECONOMY

New Brunswick Government Determined To Keep Current Expenditures Within Revenue.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 25. - (By the Canadian Press) - That the people of New Brunswick curtail, insofar as possible, demands upon the public treasury, was urged today by the mover and second of the address in reply to the speech from the Throne at the opening of the Provincial Legislature.

The mover, George H. I. Cockburn, member for Charlotte, and Dr. W. H. Coffyn, representing Gloucester County, who seconded the motion, was heard immediately after Chief Justice Sir J. Douglas Hazen, Administrator of the Province in the absence of Lieutenant Governor H. H. McLean, had delivered the speech from the throne.

Stringent economies were forecast in the speech and both Mr. Cockburn and Dr. Coffyn urged that every effort be extended to cut down expenditures. The House was adjourned until Tuesday, when further consideration will be given the speech from the Throne.

TEXT OF THRONE SPEECH

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 25. - The speech from the throne read by Sir J. Douglas Hazen, P.C., B.A., LL.D., K.C., K.C.M.G., Administrator of the Government of New Brunswick, at the opening of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick this afternoon was as follows: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: - It affords me much pleasure as Administrator of the Government of the Province of New Brunswick to welcome you on assembling for the discharge of your legislative duties. Those duties, particularly at this period, are important, but I have confidence that they will be discharged with a single desire to promote the best interests of the Province.

During recess the Province was honoured by a visit from His Excellency, the Earl of Bessborough, who, in April of last year succeeded Lord Willingdon as Governor General of Canada. The Earl of Bessborough had a distinguished record of business and public service before coming to this country and both he, and Her Excellency, the Countess of Bessborough, have already manifested a keen interest in our Canadian affairs and have greatly endeared themselves to the people of this Dominion. His Excellency received a very cordial welcome from the people of the Province.

Confident of Future

In common with the other Provinces of the Dominion, this Province has experienced the effects of the general world-wide business and economic depression. This condition has necessarily affected all our business and commercial activities. Relatively, however, our position has been good, and while there is a present need of care and prudence in public, as well as in private undertakings, we can look forward with a full measure of confidence to a further era of progress and advancement.

I am sure the people of our Province contemplate with interest the approaching Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa and earnestly hope that this important gathering will result in improved trade relations throughout the Empire. My Government is taking appropriate measures to have placed before this Conference definite information relative to our basic industries of Agriculture, Lumbering and Fishing.

Farm products during the past year were exceedingly plentiful, increases being shown in many lines of production, but, owing to the general disturbed conditions few markets were available for these products and prices were low. In order to assist in the marketing of potatoes my Government gave substantial assistance to a potato flour and starch factory in the County of Carleton. This has been of great value to many of the farmers in that section of the Province.

My Government authorized the Honourable Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, to proceed to England to support the Canadian High Commissioner and other representatives from Canada in an effort towards the removal of the embargo on Canadian potatoes, a result which would have been of great value to this Province. I regret to inform you that the effort has not, as yet, been successful. I am pleased to inform you that during the past year many of our farmers availed themselves of the bonus provided for the clearing and improving of land. This system will, it is hoped, tend to stimulate the basic industry of agriculture.

for a quantity of approximately 20,000 tons of coal per year for use at their plant, thus materially increasing the output of the mines at Minto and providing employment for a large number of our own people. I am glad to inform you that the Commission has been able this year to show a surplus in the operation of their Southern System.

Lumber Industry Hit

The lumber industry, again as a result of general world-wide conditions, continues in an uncertain and unsatisfactory position. The cut of timber from the crown lands last year was scarcely 10 per cent of the average, with much resulting unemployment and greatly reduced revenues. Despite this condition, however, it is pleasing to note that the pulp and paper mills of this Province have been operated to a fairly large percentage of their capacity. It is also encouraging to note that there is today an indication of improvement in the long lumber industry. The forest protection service has been well maintained and I am glad to inform you that the forest fire loss is the lowest for any years since the establishment of the forest service.

Commission Reports

The Commission appointed to investigate and report upon the subject of Workmen's Compensation has completed its work and the report will be presented at an early date. A measure will be presented for your consideration, embodying recommendations which require legislative sanction. It is expected that the Educational Commission will have completed the duty assigned to it, and that a report will be available before the close of the session.

The report of the Commission appointed to investigate the accounts of certain highway supervisors will be laid on the table during the session. On account of the abnormal economic conditions the revenue from several sources was substantially less than had been anticipated, while on the other hand, and for the same reason, it was deemed necessary and advisable to continue public services and undertakings in order to ameliorate the unemployment situation. As a result the deficit on current account is considerably larger than was estimated. Despite this result, due to extraordinary conditions, the financial condition of the Province is sound and its credit stands high in relation to the various Provinces of the Dominion. A striking evidence of this fact is to be seen in the success of the recent Provincial loan.

Unemployment Relief

My Government has dealt systematically and energetically with the problem of unemployment. In cooperation with the Federal Government and the Municipalities, an extensive and Province-wide programme of construction work was carried out. A registration system was introduced in order to provide, so far as possible, for the proper distribution of relief work. This has involved large expenditures of public monies and has necessarily lessened the amounts available for other purposes. In addition to the relief work referred to, arrangements have been made with the various Municipalities for assistance by direct relief, so far as this may be necessary.

Will Economize

Having regard to the uncertain conditions at present obtaining in the world of finance, affecting as it does all governmental organizations, it is obvious that the greatest care and prudence must be exercised by all public administrations. My Government has given serious consideration to this problem and has resolved that such measures must be adopted as may be necessary and adequate to assure that the current expenditures shall be maintained within the revenue.

I have directed the accounts for the past fiscal year to be laid before you. Estimates of the income and expenditure for the current year will be submitted for your consideration, and I trust you will find that they have been prepared with a due regard for economy and the requirements of the public service. I trust that your deliberations, under the direction of Divine guidance, will result in lasting benefit to the people of our Province.
