MORE SIGNS OF DEMPSEY RETURNING

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Once more there are signs and portents that widespread public demand will bring Jack Dempsey out of his retirement and into the ring again. Despite vigorous assertions by the one-time Manassa Mauler that his fighting days are over, day by day the evidence piles up that Dempsey soon will don the gloves and battle once more for the fame and wealth the ring has already given him.

DEMPSEY TRAINING

These constantly recurring reports of another Dempsey comeback gathered more credence among close followers of the ring when the former heavyweight champion entered training at a local gymnasium. Bag punching and calisthenics made up Dempsey's initial workout. He now weighs about 205 pounds, ten pounds above his normal fighting weight.

Direct questions as to whether this training program was the first step of another comeback campaign brought forth from the smiling Dempsey only a denial.

BASEBALL DEAL IS ONE OF LARGEST IN HISTORY AND INVOLVES \$200,000

BOSTON, Nov. 8.—Judge Emilio Tuchs, president of the Boston National League baseball club, announced tonight that he had traded Rogers Hornsby, second baseman and manager of the Braves, to the Chicago Cubs.

Although not stating the amount of money involved, President Tuchs intimated that close to \$200,000 was paid for the "Rajah" in addition to the five players. The players going to the Boston Braves include two regulars, second baseman Freddie Maguire and Larry Jones, southpaw pitcher, a rookie hurler and two members of the Reading, Pa., club. The Reading players are Louis Leggett, catcher, and Harry Siebolt, right-hand hurler, purchased from Los Angeles at the close of the season, completed as the quintette.

SALARY OF \$40,000

Although ranking well up among the hitters last year as a member of the Cardinals to a world championship over the New York Yankees. In the most sensational trade of the season Hornsby went to the Giants for Frankie Frisch, Hasty New York second sacker.

With the resignation of Slatery as manager early in the season, Hornsby assumed control of the lowly Braves. Despite his individual hitting efforts that carried him to another National League batting title, Hornsby was unable to make any appreciable showing with the Boston club.

In purchasing the Boston manager the Cubs take over his contract, which is said to call for annual salary of \$40,000.

May Manage Baltimore

The Baltimore Club is said to be on the market since the death of Ed Clack Dunn, and mentioned prominently among those who may buy the club are the owners of the Philadelphia Athletics. Rumor has it that the A's will buy the club for use as a farm and that Eddie Clack Dunn will be put in charge of the team until the moment when he will take Connie Mack's place as manager of the Athletics.

ALLEGED COUNTERFEIT MONEY PLOT FOILED

ST. JOHN'S, Que., Nov. 8.—Scheme to flood Montreal with \$65,000 in counterfeit money today, was nipped in the bud, it was revealed here at the preliminary hearing yesterday of one of three men, arrested several days ago.

The man standing trial was Frank Poirier, of Burlington, Vt. He was arrested here. In his pockets were found a package of money amounting to several thousands of dollars. He was charged with being in possession of spurious bills. An expert of the United States mint at Washington, here for the trial, testified that the paper found on the person of the accused, was without a doubt counterfeit United States money. The American treasury official stated the bills were so nearly perfect that they would escape detection from all but experts. The paper on which they were printed, however, proved to be the weak link, as the bills were thicker than the genuine currency turned out at Washington.

Poirier's alleged confederates were arrested at Utica, N.Y. The local hearing was continued until next week.
