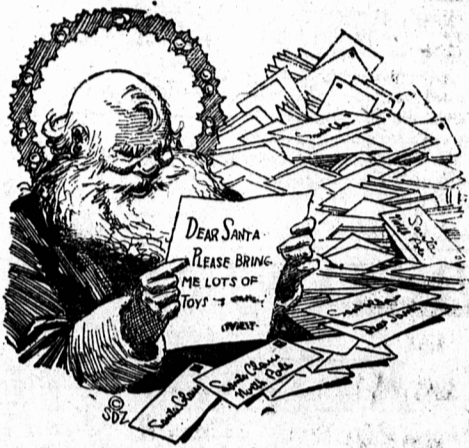

HEALTH HINTS FOR WINTER

Each year, with the coming of cold weather, we find that certain diseases return in force as it were, and as if refreshed by their summer vacation, they vigorously attack mankind. Many of these diseases disappear completely during the summer season. Common Colds, Pneumonia and Bronchitis are present all year, but in such decreased numbers that they seem, comparatively speaking, to disappear in the warm weather.

It would seem reasonable to suppose that if we could maintain our bodies in the condition in which they are in warm weather, they would be better able to combat these diseases the year round. There is not as much sunshine in winter, therefore, all the more reason for us to make the most of the sunshine that there is.

In summer, we are either outside in the fresh air, or inside with windows open. We live and sleep in air that is in motion to some extent. In winter, we should remember that a most important factor is to work and sleep in an atmosphere which has a certain amount of motion. According to the weather, windows and doors should be opened sufficiently to allow of a gentle circulation of air through the house and the office or work-place.

Many who exercise regularly in summer, by playing games, swimming, walking, etc. give it all up in the cold weather. The result is that they suffer from a loss of physical tone. We need exercise and play all through the year.

Living and working in over-heated rooms are responsible, we believe, for much of the increase in colds, pneumonia and bronchitis in the winter. The best temperature to maintain in the home and the office is 68 degrees Fahrenheit. We would recommend keeping a thermometer where it may be easily seen in order to maintain a check upon the temperature.

If people would exercise in the winter, live and work in ventilated rooms of proper temperature, and dress according to the temperature, more of them would escape the usual colds, bronchitis and pneumonia that prey upon us in winter.

Renew 200-Mile Dog Derby

THE PAS, Man. Dec. 7. (By Canadian Press)—Elaborate preparations are being made for the world's greatest 200-mile non-stop dog derby race for the Grant Rice, Walter Coyne memorial trophy, which has been re-established and will be run starting Monday, March 4, from the Pas to Flin Flon Mine and return, regardless of weather conditions.

A purse of over \$2,000 has been set for distribution among the first four winners, besides the handsome cup which already bears the inscriptions of the world famous dog "mushers," Shorty Russick and Emil St. Goddard, who each have one win to their credit.

It requires three wins to own the trophy. This will be the eleventh annual dog derby and the tremendous enthusiasm exhibited by both "mushers" and booster citizens over the decision to revert back to the great 200-mile classic points to the event being heralded as one of the greatest winter sporting features on the continent.

Eight years ago, on March 1, 1921, the race was last run over this long and hazardous trail, through the rugged hills and over the ice and snow covered lakes of northern Manitoba and was won by Bill Winterton, driving nine sturdy huskies owned by C. B. Morgan.

The shorter, lap races were instituted and have been held from year to year since 1921 but greater interest is manifest in the daring 200-mile chase, from which heroes emerged in the past.

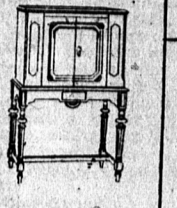

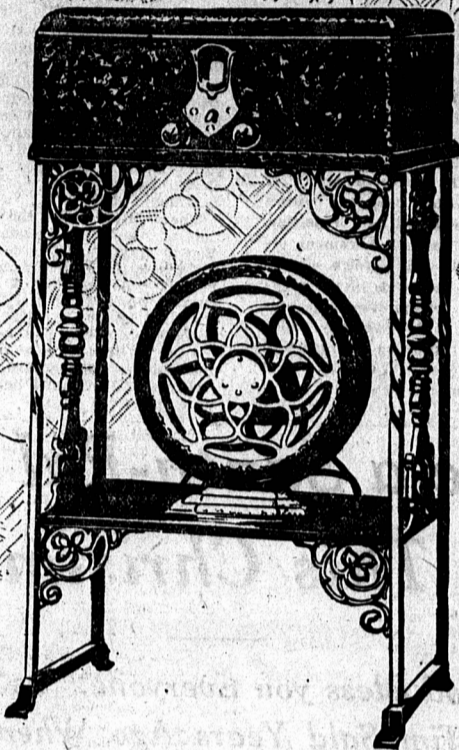

THE PAS, Man. Dec. 7 (By Canadian Press)—Bad winter for furs is predicted by Luke Clemmens, widely known Port Nelson trader, who visited here recently. White Fox and Caribou were disappearing, he said. Ten years ago the Caribou came down in great herds and traders and trappers used to kill them for dog meat. "I'd like to have a good Caribou steak right now," the husky trader declared. Clemmens was once the "Mail King" of the north country; but owing to tax diversion of the railway at Kettle Rapids to Port Churchill he no longer acts as postman. He operates stores at Port Nelson, Kettle Rapids and the end of steel on the Hudson Bay line.

Black Bears Plentiful

THE PAS, Man. Dec. 5. (By Canadian Press.) Big brown and black bears are roaming the north country in larger numbers than ever before. They are worrying livestock in some sections and land owners keep their rifles close at hand. A pair of black bears attacked and killed a team of black horses, near Hudson Bay Junction, recently, and escaped before the owner could get a gun. Near Kamsack, C. Smith and his son shot a 300-pound black bear seven feet in length. Prospectors reaching here recently complained that black bears had awakened to get the grub from sleeping bags, where it had been deposited for safety.
