When he was a small boy, an orphan, poor and living on a farm in Illinois, he was deeply interested in geology. A neighborly boy had a copy of "Lloyd's Principles of Geology." The Van Horne boy wanted to borrow it but the other boy would not lend it. Young William paid him \$2 for the use of the book for six weeks. Then he bought some foolscap paper and spent the nights of the latter part of November and all of December in his cold garret copying the book, and almost freezing. He copied the whole book, and he made a pen and ink production, as well as he could, of everyone of its thousand pictures. When he had finished the book he knew every word in it. It was this passion to learn, this thoroughness and ambition and dogged determination and energy that made him successful. He gained an efficient knowledge of everything he undertook to do, and it is related of him that when he went to build the Canadian Pacific Railway he knew more about how to lay the track than any man who had been working at that time. He laid out the track and spent the money of thousands of things that William Van Horne had learned how to do, and to do thoroughly. The motto of his is a good thing for every boy to remember: "Dogged does it."

### HINTS FROM PARIS

The very latest finish for a belt is silk tulle. The tape is such as is used for shoe lacing or corset lacing, and comes in all colors by the yard. Belts are made of the material like the dress or of a contrasting material or color, finished with from one to six eyelets, the tape laced through them and tied in a bow with rather short loops and long ends. Tape should be two inches wide, the ends fringed and tied tightly with cord to form a tasse. Belts may be tied directly in front back or side.

Another Paris novelty is a tremendous variety of black and white jewelry. Some of it is really charming. Jet, black amber and onyx, combined with pearls, brilliants and rock crystals, are made up into a multitude of artful necklaces, hair ornaments, bangles, bracelets and oval rings.

Only a few people realize the value of sachet powder, how much less expensive it is than a liquid perfume and how much more delicately subtle. A well known Parisian woman recently gave the secret of her subtlety. She powders after her bath with a sachet powder, not the regular toilet powder, which is much less scented; her clothes she keeps in a closet the walls of which are lined with cotton and tiny bags of sachet. Her lingerie is in a similar place, her handkerchiefs in a box lined with sachet; also her gloves and veils. Beyond the sachet she uses no perfumes. A good sachet costs from 50 cents to \$1 a bottle, a good liquid perfume double, and besides that one must have a body

powder. Perfume on the handkerchief is nice, but after a little it becomes stale in scent, and the same when sprayed on the gown or lingerie, and nothing is more repulsive to the average man than a perfumed woman when the perfume has lost its charm, a thing which sachet never does.
