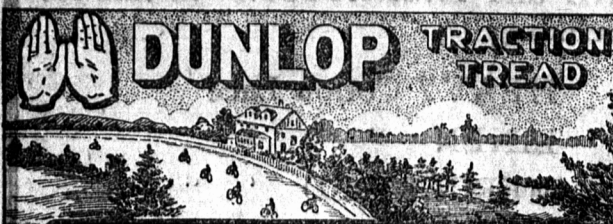

(Continued from page one) my house I want to see you." He went with him. When they were in the house he said, "I have Bennett's foxes and want good advice."

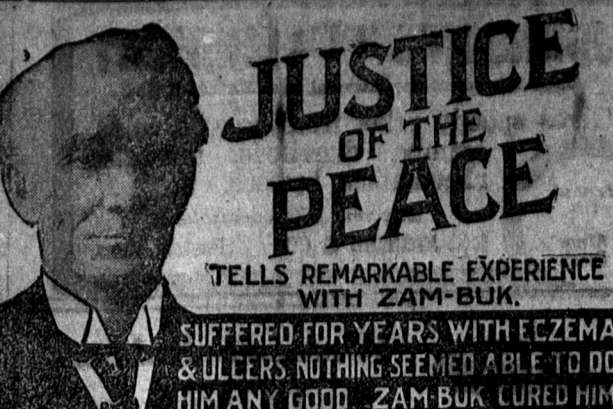
