NAPOLEON AND THE BATTLE OF WATERLOO

Sketch of the Great Military Genius and Some of His Remarkable Deeds—Superiority of British and Their Leader the "Iron Duke."

Major Kelly presided very happily at Rev. Mr. McConnell's lecture on Napoleon and Waterloo in the First Methodist Church schoolroom last evening and introduced the lecturer in eulogistic terms.

Napoleon on his return to Paris, the people welcomed him; but the treasury was exhausted. He was equal to the task, and soon had an army ready to meet the combined forces of other nations, who had resolved at the Congress of Vienna to def. at him.

The lecturer embraced facts in Napoleon's life showing the great attachment the French had for him. It clearly pointed out the wonderful magnetism of the man who, despite all that opposed him, held the affection of thousands of the bravest Frenchmen who went to their death for him.

At Quatre Bras, having encountered British troops, the British army withdrew to Waterloo, a site Wellington had considered an excellent position in meeting Napoleon's army.

The lecturer gave a description of Waterloo, which was excellent in detail. He used a map showing the positions of the opposing forces, and the valiant attempt of the French to break the British squares. Reference was made to the battle as consisting of the British army, and a tribute was paid to the bravery of the foot and also to the valor of General Hector Macdonald, who so nobly sustained the reputation of this country.

A DECISION WAS REVERSED

By the Governor in Council Against Commission

Submarine Signals Have Been Purchased—Peace River Country a Cause of Dispute—Mad Mullah Escapes.

OTTAWA, April 14—(Special)—Capt. J.F. Fraser of the Lighthouse Department has purchased three submarine signals in Boston for the three new lightships now building.

The Government in Council revised the decision of the Railway Commission on the application of the Bay of Quinte Railway for a crossing over the Canadian Pacific at Twined.

They sustain the first decision of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. THE PEACE RIVER COUNTRY. There was a big racket in the Agricultural Committee this morning between Oliver, M. P. and Prof Macoun of the Geological Survey, who held that most of the northern section of the Peace River country is worthless.

The French. Napoleon had made the journey to the French capital in great haste endeavoring to elude his pursuers. He was now a fugitive, anxious to escape to the United States but was templed in. He decided to throw his life on the mercy of the English people and wrote to the captain of the Bellerophon for a safe transport to England. The captain sailed to Plymouth with Napoleon on board. The latter hoped to enjoy the hospitality of the British. It was soon decided, however, that the only way to assure Napoleon was to send Napoleon away to some place where he would give no more trouble and, therefore, the Island of St. Helena was selected as his home. For the remainder of his days Napoleon remained there, his treatment was harsh and he spent his banishment in the bitterest terms. He was taken to St. Helena on the Northumberland, on the 5th May, 1821, in the midst of a great storm. Napoleon was taken to Paris. In conclusion the speaker said what appeared to one was the great difference in the qualities of Napoleon and Wellington. They were, in many respects, the most remarkable men in the military annals of the world. In viewing the career of the two men one learns the lesson of moral government, and the duty we owe to God and to Empire.

In a paper, just after a graphic description by the lecturer of the last charge at Waterloo, Leslie W. Cook sang "Soldiers of the King," the audience joining in the chorus. The vote of thanks was moved by Hon. Geo. Simpson and seconded by Dr. McNeill.

THE RUSSIANS DRIVEN ON THEIR MINES

An Achievement by the Japs—The Mines were Laid by the Latter—The Reports of the Last Engagement—Forces are now Landing in Manchuria.

LONDON, April 14—(Special)—It is believed that the sinking of the Russian warship Petropavlovski was a Japanese achievement and if it was not caused by a torpedo it was because the Japanese had driven the Russians on their own mines.

One report says that the mine had been laid by the Japanese just before the engagement began.

It is not believed that the Russians can recover from such a disaster in time to offer successful resistance. Japanese are now landing forces in Manchuria.

REPORTS OF LAST ENGAGEMENTS. The Japanese report that there were no losses in last engagement, while the Russians admit the torpedo destroyer Resetrashi was cut off from the fleet and sunk and the battleship Pobieda struck a mine but succeeded in reaching the inner harbor.

THE MAD MULLAH ESCAPES. ADMIRAL, April 14—(Special)—The Mad Mullah against whom the British have been conducting a campaign in Somaliland has escaped into Italian territory.

NEW YORK'S SNOW STORM. NEW YORK, April 14—(Special)—There was a regular winter snow storm here today, but it melted as it came down.
