Livestock

MONTREAL, July 8 (CP)—There were 41 cattle, 57 sheep and lambs, 128 hogs and 132 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today.

Prices on all classes of livestock were about steady.

There were not enough cattle offered to make a market.

Veal calves were \$9.50 to \$13.50. Good veals mostly \$12 up. Drinkers were \$6 to \$9.50. Drinkers and light grassers in mixed lots mostly \$7 to \$8.50. Yearlings \$6 to \$7.

Good hogs \$10 to \$11.50. Pleaner kinds at \$13. Sheep were \$5 to \$8. Hogs were \$16 for B-1 dressed. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$10 to \$10.75 tops \$11 live weight.

On the Maritime market rail grade hogs were \$15.50, cows number one up to 270 pounds \$12, number one over 270 pounds \$11, number two undesirable all weights \$10. Choice steers \$11, good common medium \$9.50, fair \$9, poor \$8.50, \$7 down. Choice heifers \$10.25, common \$7 down. Good cows \$8.25, common \$7 down. Fair \$6.75. Calves \$5.50 down, cutters \$6.25 down. Boning bulls \$7.50 down, butcher bulls \$8.50 down.

MONTREAL, July 8 (CP)—Rising tendencies in trading today on the stock exchange and curb market took all averages into higher ground. Volume and breadth were better than for some time.

Bell Telephone started business on an upward note. The issue, which slumped after the budget, recovered following a statement by that company's president, C.F. Sise, that despite taxation the 1942 dividend would be earned. At the close the stock spotted a rise of 4/8, from 138 to 140. Other notable recoveries followed in the oil group, Ottawa Power and Brazilian International Power preferred.

Advanced in miscellaneous were Dominion Bridge, St. Lawrence, Asbestos and Messey-Harris. "A" slipped.

Mines on the whole did better, increases being posted by Consolidated Smelters, Hudson Bay Mining and International Nickel. Noranda erased a loss. Imperial and International Petroleum were advanced.

Regent Knitting preferred up 1/2 point. National Breweries preferred, Distillers-Seagrams and Imperial Tobacco.
