Interesting Items.

It is a mistake to suppose that the land boom in the West applies only to Canada. More than four million acres of land in the Western States have been sold by the Northern Pacific Railway Company during the past year, most of it to actual settlers. Farming does not seem to be losing its popularity.

The allurements of the bargain-counter works its spell not upon the well-to-do shopper alone. In a Salvation Army rummage store in New York a certain sign reads: "Shoes with hole in sole, five cents; shoes without holes, ten cents. Wrappers, moth-eaten, ten cents; not moth-eaten, fifteen cents. Stockings without holes, two pairs for five cents; with holes, three pairs for five cents."

Mosquitoes are now charged with communicating erysipelas as well as malaria and yellow fever. A New York physician has issued a death certificate in the case of a fourteen months old babe in which he says: "Death was caused by erysipelas due to the bite of a mosquito." It is only fair to the mosquito to record that the Board of Health officers refused to accept the certificate until a coroner's physician had investigated and concluded that there was no other apparent cause for the death than the mosquito bite.

M. de Blowitz, in the Paris "Matin," tells how a subscriber to the "Encyclopaedia Britannica" used that work. He was a professional writer of begging letters, and in them he represented himself to be now one sort of a person, and then another, "getting up" from the pages of his encyclopaedia the necessary historical knowledge to give his letters plausibility. Thus, he explained, that having written a letter in which he was a potter who had been chemically poisoned and unfitted for work, "he used the encyclopaedia for details of his pottery trade, of which he himself was entirely ignorant. The one word, 'kaolin,' which he used in his letters, and the explanation of the use of the material, made everyone believe in the genuineness of his appeal, and brought him a perfect harvest of banknotes and postal money-orders."

There has been very little agitation of the shirt-waist problem this year, partly, probably, because the heat has not been intense enough to make coats unbearable, and partly, too, because both as to advocacy and position, the novelty has passed away. Postmen in several cities have this year been permitted to don the shirt-waist without any public outcry whatever, but it has remained for the Rev. Albert Eaton Fitch of Cleveland, O., to extend the limit of shirt-waist possibilities a distance not hitherto contemplated. He presides over the spiritual welfare of a Congregational church, and recently he preached in a shirt-waist. He says that he will continue to do this as long as the weather is so warm. Believing in personal comfort for himself, he believes in it also for his congregation, and has invited the women of his church to remove their hats during worship, and the men to remove their coats.
