OUTLINES PLAN FOR WOMEN EMIGRATION

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Dame Leach, commanding the Waacs, has outlined the ambitious scheme for the emigration of ex-service women, on which the heads of all women's war organizations are now working. Applications so far have been received from many hundreds of girls anxious to go out to the various Dominions, most of whom prefer Canada.

The chief idea, Dame Leach says, is to maintain the units now organized by proven efficient workers. They are to supply a full staff, run a hotel, club or any like institution, from cellar to garret, sending an entire force over under an administration, under whom the girls worked during the war. The first unit is going to the Guelph agricultural college soon. They also undertake to supply servants, office help and women trained in various other way. Every woman sent out will be of good conduct and medically inspected.

ON DOMESTIC HEARTH WOMAN IS QUEEN

ROME, Nov. 5.—On the domestic hearth woman is queen, said Pope Benedict today in answering an address presented to him by the Women's Unions.

The Pontiff added that changed times had given woman functions and rights she did not possess in former ages and enlarged the field of her activities, but that no alteration in man's opinion or no novelty of things or of events could separate woman, conscious of her high mission, from the family which was her natural centre.

Pope Benedict praised the growing determination of the Catholic woman to dedicate herself to the education of youth, and the betterment of the family school.

"The Catholic woman," said the Pontiff, "besides feeling it her duty to be virtuous, must feel it her duty to appear such in the fashion of her clothes, repudiating those exaggerations of fashion which show the corruption of those who designed them, and bringing an evil contribution to the general corruption of manners, fashions contrary to that modesty which should be the fairest ornament of the Christian woman."

The Pontiff strongly urged the formation of a league of Catholic women to fight what he termed the indecency of fashion, not only in their own clothing, but also of that of persons in families who approach them.
