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# FRANCE WILL NOT CEDE ANY TERRITORY

## NAVAL UNITS ORDERED TO BREAK STRIKE

### OVERTURES FOR PEACE ARE IGNORED

Daladier Government Continues Using Stern Measures To Curb Uprising.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)  
PARIS, Dec. 5.—Premier Daladier's government tonight ignored labor overtures for peace and ordered naval detachments to Le Havre to break the strike that has tied up the liner Normandie and other shipping.

The government determined to use the same stern methods in the shipping strike that it employed last week to crush the metal-workers strike in northern France and the one-day nation-wide walkout against its economic decrees.

Three naval lieutenants and 126 sailors left Lorient for Le Havre to take the place of strikers, while other groups of sailors were sent from Cherbourg and other naval bases.

The merchant marine ministry refused to receive a delegation of the strikers who sought a compromise by dismissal of charges against four of their leaders and the release of 60 of their number who were in the general strike last Thursday.

Approximately 1,500 of the Normandie crew, 2,000 workers on the liner Paris and the liner France and 1,500 dock workers and port handlers refused to work at Le Havre in sympathy with the 60 discharged employees.

Military requisitions threatening them with martial law for failure to obey work orders failed to break their strike.

The merchant marine ministry declared the liner Paris would leave Le Havre for New York Wednesday and that the Normandie which missed her sailing Saturday as a result of the strike would be returned to service on her next scheduled sailing date, Dec. 17.

Elsewhere the anti-government strike wave began to subside. The national committee of the General Confederation of Labor began a series of conferences to

## Prosperity For Canada Predicted

LONDON, Dec. 6.—(Tuesday)—(CP Haves)—A great wave of prosperity for Canada, with the United Kingdom sharing in the benefit, was predicted today by Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express (Independent).

"The golden corn (grain) of the Prairie Provinces brings a great access of prosperity to the Dominion of Canada," the editorial said. "The estimate is that the wheat production of those provinces will be double that of last year."

"Mining industries are expanding. The newspaper industry shows improvement. The prospect is that Canada, which has not suffered a business recession to anything like the same degree as the United States, will now go forward with immense strides."

"And we in Britain will rejoice in that prospect all the more because we must necessarily share in the good times that Canada enjoys."

## FOX PROGRAM YESTERDAY IS SUCCESSFUL

Demonstration In Paton Pavilion Largely Attended By Ranchers.

The fox demonstration program under the auspices of the Charlottetown Fox Club held in the Paton Pavilion Exhibition grounds, yesterday was highly successful. Northward of the heavy roads a large number of fox ranchers were present, many of them bringing foxes. Adult classes were used, being separate demonstrations for males and females. Various color phases from medium to extra pales were represented. First prize was won by a black and white fox, owned by Mr. J. W. Fieldman. Fred Burke, explained the desirable and undesirable points of each fox. Mr. Mayers gave a lot of other very valuable information, bringing out points that were entirely new to most of these present.

## JEWS BARRED FROM OWNING REAL ESTATE

Latest Decree Gives Government Strangle-hold On Jews Resources.

BERLIN, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The Nazi Regime took a strange hold today on the remaining resources of German Jews in a sweeping decree issued by Economics Minister Walther Funk.

The decree contains "the legal basis for the full aryanization of German economic life," German Real Estate and other important parts of the national wealth," an official explanation said.

Proper authorities were empowered to carry out the aryanization wherever, according to the explanation, it is necessary economically for the good of the nation.

How far and within what period of time this power will be used is left to the discretion of the economic minister.

Announcement of the decree did not say when it becomes effective, a point that may not be clarified until it appears in the official Gazette Monday.

The decree, which applies only to German Jews and stateless Jews, further affects them in that henceforth they must have Government approval in liquidating their fortunes or properties or in using their capital. This means a Jewish family must obtain Government orders on prices. Transactions are subject to special government assessment.

Funk's decree: 1. Empowered the higher administrative officers to order Jews to sell or liquidate their businesses, real estate and other possessions. 2. Directs to be appointed by these officers may carry out the task in special cases where a Jew does not obey an order or is absent.

3. Forbade Jews hereafter to acquire real estate or title thereto, or any other paper of value, in a bank within one week after the law becomes effective. The deposits are to be labelled Jewish property and may be removed only with the approval of government authorities.

4. Forbade Jews to acquire, pawn or sell without permits objects made of gold, platinum or silver, precious stones, and pearls. 5. Prohibited such objects are to be handled exclusively through special State Sales Offices, one of which already has been established in Berlin.

6. The decree applies to art objects valued at more than 1,000 marks (\$400). 7. Nazis said precipitate liquidation

## Rumanian Envoy To Britain Recalled

BUCHAREST, Dec. 5.—(AP)—A royal decree today disclosed Basile Grigorescu, Rumanian Minister to Great Britain, had been recalled from London and retired from public service.

The decree caused speculation here as to whether something had gone wrong with King Carol's state visit to England Nov. 15 to 18. It was indicated a Charge D'Affaires probably would represent Rumania in London for some time.

## French Premier States Nation's Stand Clearly

Italian Campaign For Tunisia Gains Momentum France Accused Of Taking "Provocative Attitude".

PARIS—Premier Daladier declares France is resolved to demand respect for "absolute integrity" of all French territory by "every means," answering Italian clamor for Tunisia and Corsica and German colonial demands.

ROME—Italian press accuses France of "provocative attitude" in allowing Tunisian anti-Italian demonstrations; Gayda, authoritative editor, indicates Italy will press demands on France in future.

LONDON—Prime Minister Chamberlain informs Parliament he has received assurances that the Italian Government "did not associate" itself with territorial demonstrations against France.

TUNIS—Police guards placed about Italian consulates in Tunis and Sousse after anti-Italian demonstrations in both cities.

AJACCIO, Corsica—Mayor appeals to populace to remain calm after demonstrations against Italy in Ajaccio, Bastia and other Corsican cities. Various organizations send telegrams of loyalty to French Government.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt—French editor formally protests against stoning of his home by 40 Italian youths who shouted "down with France."

PARIS, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Premier Daladier said today France was resolved to demand respect for "the absolute integrity" of all French territory by "every means."

This was his answer to the Italian clamor over French Corsica and Tunisia. Informed quarters read into it an additional message to Germany—France intends to keep her colonies despite Germany's demands.

His declaration as it affects Germany was held significant in view of the arrival here tomorrow of Joachim Von Ribbentrop, German Foreign Minister, to sign a non-war pact and to discuss the political situation.

Daladier's remarks were in a communication announcing his intention to visit Corsica and Tunisia shortly after Jan. 1. He urged inhabitants there to remain calm.

The plea followed yesterday's notorious demonstrations against Italy and protesting loyalty to France.

Of the Italian press campaign and Chamber of Deputies' demonstration regarding France and French possessions, Daladier said: "There is no need to state that these Italian actions have met with strong opposition against the cession of any territory over which the National flag floats."

He said the loyalty demonstrations in Tunisia and Corsica were "the response that could be made" to Italian cries for French territory. He noted that the Italian colonial claims were not formulated by the government.

As French diplomats hastened preparations for tomorrow's signing of the good neighbor pact with Germany, France indicated the basis for what is hoped to be a lasting friendship.

The usually well-informed Le Temps said today of the pact to be signed tomorrow: "It is a question above all of creating a new political atmosphere between the democratic forces and in Italian terms."

## Third Candidate Enters Field For Conservative Leadership

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—(CP)—A new candidate and a revival of the dispute between Col. George A. Drew and Hon. Earl Rowe entered Ontario's Conservative Party convention picture today. The convention to name a leader to succeed Mr. Rowe is scheduled for Thursday and Friday.

Rev. Norman Rawson, pastor of Centenary United Church, Hamilton, announced he is a leadership candidate.

There was published a letter written April 30, 1937, by Col. Drew, former Conservative organizer, now a leadership candidate, to Hon. Earl Rowe urging Mr. Rowe to accept proposals for a coalition government. (Premier Hepburn has denied he proposed a coalition government.)

Tonight Col. Drew said his only knowledge of the union government offer came from Mr. Rowe and that two weeks after they were made Mr. Rowe told him he was inclined to consider them favorably.

"I want it clearly understood that the talk of coalition came to me from Mr. Rowe," said Col. Drew. "All that I refer to in the letter were communicated to me by Mr. Rowe apart from this: That I was in the room when he (Mr. Rowe) made arrangements by telephone to see Mr. Hepburn. Mr. Rawson became the fourth declared candidate for the office vacated by Mr. Rowe. Others who have announced they will be in the balloting Friday are Col. Drew, Wilfred Houghton and Hon. Earl Lawson. All four say they are in to the end."

## Italian Demands On Tunisia Called 'Nuisance Claims'

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Italian claims on Tunisia, Corsica and Nice, which are being played up by the Italian press, tonight were placed on the list of "nuisance claims" by unofficial circles here which, however, do not underestimate their disturbing influence on European relations.

According to lists theory the Italian Government is raising the claims simply to gain some other objective, perhaps a share in control of the Suez Canal Company, or belligerent rights for Corsica. France in Spain, Official London has no information on the subject beyond Count Ciano's statement to the Earl of Perth that the Italian Government dissociated itself from the public demonstration in the Italian Chamber of Deputies Nov. 30.

If the unofficial theory is correct, Premier Mussolini and Count Ciano, his Foreign Minister, will drop the territorial claims, when the right moment arrives, in return for some other concession.
