Miss M. S. HERDMAN, the returned missionary from India, writing to a friend in this City from Cornwall, Ont. says:—The farewell service is to be held in this town, January 12 h. Dr. Moore of Ottawa is to represent the Foreign Mission Board and the ministers of the town and some of the Presbytery are to be present. I am to speak at the meeting and will sail from New York on the 17th. My address in India will be in care of Dr. Macs, McKeller Canadian Presbyterian Mission, Neemuch, Central India.

A FEW days ago while crossing the Hillsboro Riv r below his farm at Fort Augustus, William Webster had a narrow escape from drowning and losing a team of horses. He was passing over the ice with the horses and a load of hogs while behind was his man with a single horse and three hogs in the sleigh. When part way over the ice was apparently weak but he managed to get over with his team. The man behind however was not so fortunate and moving a little from the leading track the horse, sleigh and pigs broke through the ice. By the time the horse was rescued two of the pigs were swimming and after a time were got up on the ice. The third, however, was not so fortunate, was caught in the sleigh and drowned.

EDWARD CAMPBELL, formerly one of the successful teachers of Prince County who is now located in Michel, B. C. writes interestingly of the West and the prospects there. He says in part: I left High River, Alta, on the morning of September 23rd, and arrived at McLeod about noon, where I had to wait for about fifteen hours for the first train going west. The town McLeod is situated in a very strange manner, about two miles from the station. As there were no boarding houses or hotels at the station I had to go to the city to pass away the fifteen hours wait. It was easy to do this as the hotel coaches meet every train. McLeod is situated right on the prairie or rather what I would call a desert, as the ground is all sand with not a tree or hill near. It is quite a town, almost as large as Summerside. We left again at five and at daybreak things looked somewhat different as we were almost to the mountains. Talk about curves—the P. E. I. R. curves cannot compare at all with those found in the mountains. One place they travel two miles and gain two hundred feet. The place is called the loop as they must of necessity form a loop to make such a curve. They make this curve to get down off of the mountain into the Crow's Nest Pass. About two miles farther on I arrived at my destination—Michel. Michel is a mining town and is situated right in the Pass between high mountains. The pass is very narrow—less than a quarter of a mile and it looks even narrower as the sides of the mountains are very steep—so steep that they appear to be almost over your head. There is a rapid river running down the centre of pass leaving room for one row of houses on one side of it and two rows and the rail track on the other. This is the first and only river I have seen flowing west. We only get six or seven hours of sun in the day as the mountains shut the sunshine from us. When we have rain in the valley it always snows on the mountains. It is a very pretty sight at morning after rain to see the sun shining on the snow-covered trees. The coal mines are situated at the west end of the town and are nine in number, some of them are working and some are not. These mines are simply tunnels driven into the sides of the mountain. They first drive a tunnel straight in about 70 or 80 feet up the side of the mountain and from the mouth of this tunnel a bridge extends across the pass to the mountain on the other side where another tunnel goes into that mountain. From these main tunnels there are numerous branches running in all directions through the mountains. In these tunnels and sub-tunnels, there is a track laid on which they run small cars down by horses into where the miners is mining the coal. When these cars are filled they are drawn out on the bridge or tippie as it is called where the coal is weighed and sorted. The coarse coal is kept or shipping and the fine dust is taken to the coke ovens where coke is manufactured. This town is owned altogether by the company. They will not sell a foot of land or allow a person to build a house or any kind of building on it. They run the stores and charge their own prices for goods. I will give you a few quotations and let you see what we have to pay for our goods. Cheese shoes \$1.00, rubber boots with leather soles \$7.00, suspenders (like those we pay 45c for) \$1.00, eggs 50c per dozen, leather gloves \$1.50, writing pads (like P. E. I. 15c ones) 35c and everything else corresponds in price. A person would stand a poor chance teaching school out here at the salary we used to get home, as board ranges from \$22.00 to \$30.00 per month.
