A SUCCESSFUL SALE.—The sale of the Island Stock Breeding Company's farm property, stock, crop, implements, etc. at Frenchfort last week was one of the largest ever held on the Island. Upwards of one thousand people were in attendance and the auctioneer, Mr. Benjamin Carter states that it was one of the biggest sales he ever attended and he certainly has seen some. The farm comprising of about 390 acres was sold to Mr. O'Connors, of O'Leary, for \$8,800. The implements all sold at exceptionally high prices.

LT. (REV.) E. SMITH AT MALTA.—Lieut. (Rev.) Edwin Smith, R. N. V. R., who is now at Malta, where he recently arrived from Italy in command of a flotilla of three of his Majesty's ships, was on January 10th unanimously elected a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society of London. For many years Lieut. Smith has made a special study of astronomy and navigation, which has served him in good stead during his war. Many of his astronomical articles have appeared from time to time in the Canadian American magazines, and these, together with the manuscript of his forthcoming book on astronomy, were placed before the Royal Astronomical Society, with the result that he was unanimously elected to a Fellowship therein. Lieut. Smith is the fifth Canadian to have the honor of a Fellowship in the Royal Astronomical Society conferred upon him. He is a native of Merigomish, N. S., and was for some years pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Cardigan and on the outbreak of war gave up his pastoral charge in Ontario to enlist in the R. N. V. R.
