OTTAWA, Jan. 31—(CP)—Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Chief Justice and former Liberal Premier of Prince Edward Island, and Dr. William Kaye Lamb of Ottawa, Dominion Architect, have been appointed members of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada for a five-year period, it was announced today.

U. S. Recognizes Israel, Trans-Jordan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31—(AP)—President Truman today granted full-fledged United States recognition to Israel and the Arab kingdom of Trans-Jordan. The White House made separate announcements of the two actions. This emphasized the official United States position that there has been no "deal" with Britain to trade American recognition of Trans-Jordan for British recognition of Israel.

Prince Edward Island's fisheries industry will be well represented at the third annual East Coast Fisheries Conference which takes place this week at the Nova Scotia Hotel, Halifax, Mr. J. A. Robb, now in Ottawa, who has been acting as director of fisheries for this Province, will represent the Provincial Government. Others in attendance will include Messrs. Sidney Burnhoe, Charlottetown, president of the P. E. I. Fisheries Federation; J. E. Burden, Charlottetown, vice president; John M. Myrick, Tisbury, a director and past president of the Federation, and a director of the Fisheries Council of Canada; Frank Cameron, Summerside and Paul Gallant, Souris, Federation directors, and J. B. Jenkins, Summerside, also a member of the Federation. The conference, which will cover a wide field in connection with East Coast fisheries problems, will convene tomorrow with J.H. MacKichan, president of the Atlantic Salt Fish Exporters Association, presiding. Following addresses of welcome by Premier Macdonald of Nova Scotia, Mayor Albert of Halifax, and President W.E. Simpson of the Fish Packers Association of the Maritime Provinces, the business sessions will open.

Social Credit Pioneer Dies At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Jan. 31—(CP)—Norman Jacques, 68, a pioneer advocate of Social Credit and member of Parliament for Wetaskiwin, Alta., since 1935, died suddenly here today.

Prime Minister St. Laurent and other members joined in sympathy over his death and paid tribute to the honesty and fighting spirit of a man they often opposed. The opposition mainly had stemmed from Mr. Jacques' impassioned denunciations of international political Zionism which brought charges that he was anti-Jewish.

Scarcity Of Groundfish Seen Threat

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31—(AP)—The United States today said that "the general scarcity of groundfish on the New England banks has not been disastrous to America's fishing industry only because of the very high prices being paid for fish."

One delegate said: "In an effort to continue bringing in haddock to satisfy the large demand, the industry has been forced to resort to fishing for immature and baby fish. This development is extremely unfortunate, for although admittedly it is increasing the present catch to a certain extent, it is seriously decreasing the potential production."

ARRESTED IN NEW YORK

The U. S. Justice Department has said that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has arrested Sam Carr, former organizing secretary of the Canadian Communist party. The announcement said that Carr was arrested in New York. It described him as a key figure in Soviet spying in Canada. He played an important part, the department said, in the spy network which was exposed in September, 1945, after some testimony by Igor Gouzenko, a Russian embassy cipher clerk. F. B. I. Director J. Edgar Hoover said Carr is wanted in Canada for violation of the Official Secrets Act.
