NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(AP)—United States-Japanese war in the Pacific touched off a sharp decline in securities markets today but gave most commodities one of their best lifts in more than a year.

Blocks of 1,000 to 6,000 shares or so changed hands in rapid succession at the start. Dealings slowed as recoveries appeared. A downturn was resumed after midday as Congress voted all-out war on Japan.

Led by Distillers Seagram which lost 2 1/8 points to 15 3/8, Canadian stocks were lower. Walkers fell 1 1/2 points to 33. Dome Mines 5-8, International Nickel 3-8, McIntyre Mines 7-8, Canadian Pacific 1-2, Ford A 1-8, Hollinger and Imperial Oil 1-4, and Lake Shore 1-2. Brazilian traction was unchanged.

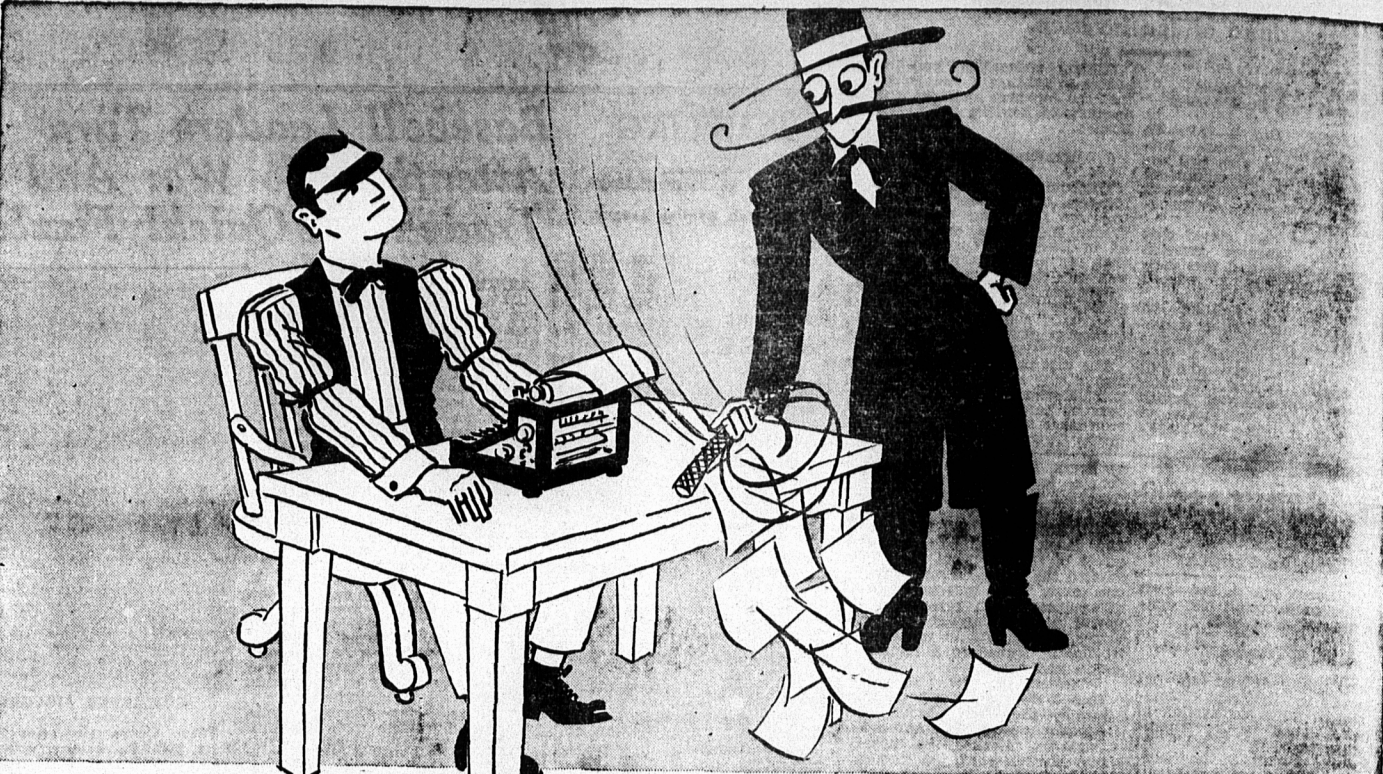
Associated Press average 80 stocks was off 17 points at 261.8, new low since June 10, last year, and the widest day's drop since May 10, 1941. Trading was the broadest since May 22 a year ago, 965 individual issues changing hands. Turnover was 2,027,960 shares.

In the "new low" division were N.Y. Central, Pennsylvania, Great Northern, Chesapeake & Ohio, Bethlehem Steel, Republic Steel, General Motors, Chrysler and Sears Roebuck.

Eastman Kodak lost 5 1/2 points, Dow Chemical 4 3/8, American Can 4 1/8, Case 4 and Allied Chemical 4.

To Into Exchange

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—(CP)—The stock market responded to the outbreak of war in the Pacific with losses all round, but especially in the gold and industrial groups. The weakest period came in the final half-hour, there had been a couple of modest rallies during the day.

Grain

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—(CP)—In sympathy with the Chicago market where prices were up the maximum of 5 cents, wheat futures advanced 3-8-5-8 cent on Winnipeg grain exchange today. At the close December sold for 75 1-8 cents a bushel, May 78 3-4 and July 80.

In the coarse grain pit good buying in all grains, was shown, largely in sympathy with southern markets. Oats and barley were a cent higher at one time and flax up approximately 2 1-2 and rye 2 cents better.

Livestock

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—(CP)—Cattle receipts totalled 1,139 on Montreal livestock markets today, with calf receipts at 1,281, sheep receipts at 666 and hog receipts at 767.

Good calves were easier, all other kinds of livestock firm. The cattle market was firm to a shade higher in spots. Good steers sold from \$9 to \$9.75, medium steers \$7.50 to \$8.75 and common from \$7.25 down. Fed calves sold from \$9 to 12 and heifers mostly \$5 to \$8. Good heifers mostly \$7.50 up.

Good cows were \$6.75 to \$7, odd tops \$7.50. Medium cows \$5.50 to \$6.50 and common from \$4.50 to \$5.25. Bulls ranged from \$4.50 to a top of \$7. Good bulls \$6.25 up.

Currencies

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(CP)—The Canadian dollar and the pound Sterling firmed unchanged in relation to the United States dollar today in foreign exchange dealings that were at a standstill most of the day. Sterling was quoted at \$4.84 and the Dominion currency at a discount of 11 1/2 per cent. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.)

All dealings in Japanese currency were suspended, and banks were not quoting other Far Eastern monies. Because of religious holidays, there was no business in Latin-American currencies.

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—(CP)—Securities on the stock exchange today rolled with the punch from the disturbing war news and setbacks generally were fractional, while some issues fought back.

Chipped of small amounts in industrials were National Steel Car, General Steel Wares, Alcohol "A", East Mal, Eldorado Foundation and Dominion Coal preferred.

The St. Lawrence Corporation stocks, Dryden and Bathurst were slightly down in newspapers and in carriers the Canada Steamship issues and C.P.R. edged backward.
