**Sultan of Egypt Proclaimed King**

CAIRO, March 20.—The proclamation of the Sultan Ahmed Fuad Pasha, as King of Egypt, today was accompanied by the firing of salutes of 101 guns in Cairo, Alexandria and Port Said, and of 21 guns in all the other provincial capitals.

Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, hitherto the British High Commissioner, accompanied by members of his staff, called at the royal palace and congratulated King Fuad, whom he addressed as "Your Majesty."

Field Marshal Sarwat Pasha, the King addressed a letter to "our noble nation," in which he said, in part:

"God has graciously permitted the independence of Egypt to be attained by our hands. We are grateful to God, and hereby announce to the world that from today Egypt enjoys independence and sovereignty."

"We have taken for ourselves the title His Majesty, King of Egypt, in order to insure the country's dignity and its international position. We ask God's assistance to bear witness that we shall endeavor to work for the welfare and happiness of our beloved country. We hope this day will inaugurate an era which will restore Egypt's grandeur."

CAIRO, March 20.—An Exchange of telegrams took place today, says the declaration of Egypt's independence was followed by several demonstrations in Cairo, the crowds smashing street lamps and uprooting trees. Egyptian cavalry was ordered out to restore order.

**BANK CLERK ARRESTED**

TORONTO, March 20.—John Conolly, a clerk in the clearing department of the chief office of the Bank of Montreal here, was taken into custody tonight on a charge of stealing \$4,000 from the bank. After spending one hour in a cell, Conolly was released on bail. The amount was fixed at \$10,000, and for \$5,000 each being furnished by Mrs. Helen Conolly, mother of the young man, and William C. Bonner.

While the police officers and officials of the bank refused to discuss the case, it was learned that Conolly voluntarily given certain information regarding the shortages charged up against him and that some of the money had been used to settle gambling debts.

**Summerside Memorial Banquet**

A splendid banquet under the auspices of the Summerside Board of Trade, in aid of the Prince County Soldiers' Memorial Fund, was held in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside, on Thursday night and was attended by over 150 members of the Board and other citizens, with a few friends from the country. The President of the Board, Mr. L. R. Allen, presided and great credit is due the Committee responsible for the program and arrangements generally and to the good ladies who provided such an ample treat and waited upon the guests in the most pleasing manner.

After the banquet there was a program of speeches, interspersed with musical choruses. The subject matter was "A Cold Storage Plant for Summerside," the "Housing Scheme," the "Soldiers' Memorial." The President first addressed the meeting upon Board of Trade affairs. The minutes of the last meeting of the Board were then read and approved, together with the Treasurer's report. Mr. Allen spoke at some length on the benefits to be derived from such a plant at Summerside. He gave figures to show that the capital required would be \$50,000. The plant 225 days in the year would cost \$5,900 and bring in a revenue of \$8,000, sufficient to pay a dividend of 7 per cent. There was plenty of money in Summerside and with the necessary enterprise such a plant should be running here within a year. He urged the following resolutions:

That this Board place itself on record as favoring such an undertaking and pledges its support and influence on behalf of such citizens of Summerside and vicinity as may take the matter in hand.

That the President of this Board appoint a committee of seven to look into the possibility of promoting a company for the erection and equipment of a cold storage plant and report on same at our regular April meeting.

The motion was seconded by Mr. G. W. Robinson, strongly supported by Mr. E. H. Rayner and members of the committee appointed—Messrs. C. R. Rogers, P. G. Clark, H. McGonigal, E. H. Rayner, W. H. McGonigal, Mr. Allen, McNeill and G. W. Robinson.

Mr. H. T. Holman, explained the Housing Scheme, its necessity and the means of putting it into effect. He moved that in the opinion of the meeting the Summerside Town Council should appoint a committee to wait upon the Council in connection therewith.

Mr. Adrien Arsenault seconded the motion, which was supported by Messrs. B. G. Rogers, and W. J. Lidstone and the following committee appointed—Messrs. H. T. Holman, W. J. Lidstone, Adrien Arsenault and B. G. Rogers.

The "Making of our Streets" was next debated and a motion of Rev. W. H. Harding, seconded by Mr. Charles Hensley and supported by Mr. B. G. Rogers, was carried in support of the measure. The three speakers named were appointed a committee to wait upon the Town Council and press the matter.

Ably speeches were then delivered on the Soldier's Monument by Mayor Campbell, Mr. J. LeRoy Holman and Mr. J. E. Dalton. A fine drawing of the proposed monument was shown, or which cuts will later be furnished to the press and reproductions in miniature made for sale and to send to natives of Prince County now living outside the province. Medals won by Prince County heroes, including the Mons Star, were also exhibited.

Messrs. Adrien Arsenault and Wallace Harding were elected new members of the Board.

The hearty vote of thanks to the ladies, with musical honors, was moved by Mr. Greenham MacKay.

God Save the King brought this most enjoyable and profitable proceedings to a close.

**Aviation's Effect On Naval Warfare Debated in House**

LONDON, March 20.—A question much discussed lately—to what extent developments in aviation may render naval warfare more obsolete—was raised in the House of Commons tonight in the course of a debate on the naval estimates, which were introduced today. Mr. Hon. Austen Chamberlain, Government leader, outlined the present policy of the Government on the question. Mr. Chamberlain said he might soon lead the world to believe that limitation of battleships or armament would be of little use, unless similar limitation was placed on aircraft. There he could only declare the Government's policy as things stand at present.

Believing, as the Government did, that the air force had become a potent force as an adjunct to the naval and military services, and convinced that in the future the greatest danger to Great Britain might well be from an action by air forces, the Government considered it would be a retrograde step to abolish the Air Ministry and reabsorb the air force into the Admiralty and the War Office.

Mr. Chamberlain announced that the standing committee of the Committee on Imperial Defence, after long and careful inquiry, had arrived at the following conclusions:

First, that the air force should be autonomous in matters of administration and education; second, in case of defence against air raids, the army and navy must play a secondary role; third in case of military or naval operations, the air force must be in strict subordination to the general or admiralty in supreme command.

In other cases, such as the protection of commerce and an attack on enemy harbors and inland towns, the relations between the air forces and the other services shall be regarded as a matter of cooperation.

Mr. Chamberlain added that the Government had decided to appoint a committee to advise on a scheme for the most efficient use of the air force.
