PARSNIPS, EARLIEST VEGETABLES IN THE GARDEN

The parsnip is the first vegetable crop to be gathered from the garden. You can start on it in November and keep on gathering and eating it so long as you have the ambition to delve in frozen soil. It is one of the few root crops whose roots are hardy and will live in the ground all winter. Noted for its sugary sweetness this quality does not develop fully until the parsnip has had the benefit of freezing weather.

It is a long season crop, needing to grow all summer to develop good roots to be dug during the winter. It should be sown at once. It is an iron-clad hardy plant and the seed can be sown as soon as the ground can be put into condition.

Little has been done for the parsnip and these are only a few varieties. Not much is needed as it is good enough as it is when properly grown. Two standard varieties are the Hollow Crown or Large Sugar and the Guernsey, much alike, the latter being a shorter and sturdier root. The main factor in getting good parsnips of fairly smooth surface and regular shape is to see that they are thinned to stand from 4 to 6 inches apart in the row.

This will give them an opportunity to develop into uniform size. Too often because of crowding there are all sizes of roots in the row and only a small percentage of them are really good roots for the table.

Another factor is that the roots should not come into contact with strong fertilizer, particularly fresh manure. When this happens the roots fork and become misshapen. The uniformly tapering round roots are the type sought for the show table in the fall.

The soil should be rich and commercial fertilizer may be worked into it for exhibition roots much more safely than stable manure. The parsnip often in country gardens is left to shift for itself and the patch grows up to weeds. The parsnip obligingly goes along about its business and forms edible roots but there would have been much better roots if it had been given as good cultivation as the rest of the garden.

Sir Henry Thornton Outlines Policy

KITCHENER, Ont., May 12.—The policy of the Canadian National Railways with respect to the unemployment situation was outlined by Sir Henry Thornton, Chairman and President of the National System, in an address delivered before the Board of Trade. After giving a brief sketch of the events preceding the depression, Sir Henry said "We were suddenly visited last Autumn with a shrinkage of revenues. Two courses were open to us, that of the immediate dismissal of a large number of men, with its attendant misery and the transfer of the burden of maintaining them to the cities or provinces, or that of a more liberal policy of prudence and foresight which permitted us to extend their continuity of service. It is a comparatively easy thing to alter a transitory condition into a permanent condition. The traffic falling off would be of relatively short duration and if we kept up our courage and endeavored to keep the wheels of progress turning, the bad times would pass. If on the other hand, we had pursued a different policy, much harm would have been done. I maintain that such a policy as we pursued in keeping as many of our men as possible employed was a sound business one and in the last analysis, helped to promote trade and at the same time we were doing business a good turn and ourselves a good turn. It is an accepted axiom that, on the average, only so much may be got out of any particular proposition. Capital, for example, can write a maximum amount of service out of its employees for a certain period, the employees can take a certain amount of money out of capital by unfair wages for a certain length of time, but these things cannot endure. Such things as enter into human economics cannot be carried on into perpetuity unless balanced by other things."

FIRE LOSS RECORD

Fire losses in Canada during the week ended May 7, 1930, were estimated by The Monetary Times at \$632,850, as compared with \$171,650 for the previous week, and with \$607,100 for the corresponding week of last year. From January 1, 1929, to May 8, 1929, fire losses totalled \$8,541,000, and from January 1, 1930, to May 7, 1930, they were \$10,083,250.

ed upon justice and fair dealings. We maintain a doctrine that, not only are the people of Canada shareholders in the National System, but that our employees are partners and that this partnership continues on a basis of fair dealing. This was the underlying principle that prompted the Railway Company to seek means to continue employing the most of its men and I believe that it was a policy which commends itself to the country.

Sir Henry stated that one frequently hears references of competition between the state and privately-owned systems. He believed that competition is the spur which drives towards higher efforts and stated that he welcomed it. There were two types of competition however; one that was wasteful and brought about the spending of money for transitory advantages; the other was that which aimed to improve service and provide the latest facilities and methods of operations. He drew attention to the improvements made and latest types of equipment which the National System had installed and of the new speedy train schedules, pointing to these as examples of a healthy type of competition. "It must be remembered, however," Sir Henry warned, "that a railway is a hard banker when it comes to borrowing from the future. Deteriorated equipment, road bed permitted to fall into inferiority and general lack of maintenance, cost high. We refuse to borrow from the future at such an extortionate rate of interest. We have demonstrated to the full that a state-owned railway can be operated just as efficiently and as honestly as a privately-owned road and that it may blaze the trail to set an example to private corporations."

In the morning, Sir Henry was the guest of the City of London, Ont., and addressed a civic luncheon. There he received the honor of being given the freedom of the city. Mayor Kilpatrick pointed out that this honor was conferred only upon rare occasions and for distinguished services to the nation at large.
