—Hon. A. L. Macdonald — Hon. Angus Lewis Macdonald was born Aug. 10, 1890, at Dunvegan, Inverness County, Nova Scotia. He is a graduate of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, and Dalhousie Law School, Halifax.

—Col. C. W. Gibson — Col. Colin William George Gibson was born in Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 16, 1891. Son of the late Major-General Sir John M. Gibson. He was educated at the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., and at Osgoode Hall, and was called to the Ontario bar in 1915. Col. Gibson served in the First

—Col. William Pate Mulock is the youngest of the cabinet ministers, 43 years old today. He was born July 8, 1897, in Toronto, son of William Mulock, K. C., and grandson of Rt. Hon. Sir William Mulock, retired former Chief Justice of Ontario.

—A graduate of University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall, Col. Mulock practices law with a Toronto firm. He served with a Canadian ammunition company in the Siberian Expeditionary Force.

—He was first elected to the House of Commons in a by-election Sept. 24, 1924, and was returned in the general elections of 1925 and 1940.

—Great War with the Royal Fusiliers and several decorations for distinguished service, including the Military Cross, the Belgian Croix de Guerre and the Order of Leopold.

—Durham, Eng.—(CP)—Westman Dickinson first Viscount Cowdray wounded in the Battle of Flanders, has had his left arm amputated. He is in Durham hospital.

—The following is from the Halifax Chronicle of July 8: Vernon John Worth, one of the best known business men in the city's world, died suddenly Saturday night of a heart attack. He was 45 years old. Death came in the Göttingen street drugist's shop a short time after he had closed his store for the night. He had been in apparent good health and was at work as usual Saturday.

—Born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., he had been living in Halifax for about 30 years having come here as a youth to take a position as clerk in the drug store of his brother-in-law, H. A. Watson, on Jacob street. After coming here he also attended Dalhousie University from which he later graduated in pharmacy.

—On graduation he took over the drug business of Mr. Watson, then moved to 88 Göttingen street, where he has been located ever since.

—His death removes one of the city's leading druggists. He was active in a number of Halifax organizations, having served as president of the Progressive Club and as grand master of Burns Masonic Lodge. He was also a past president of the Pharmaceutical Society of Canada. Among other organizations for which he was active was the Halifax Exhibition Commission which he assisted in a large measure in handling of tickets.

—Surviving are his wife, the former Annie Doyle of Halifax, a daughter, Phoebe, at home; three brothers, Harry in Oregon, Fred of Vancouver and Percy in Charlottetown; and three sisters, Mrs. L. R. McKenney, Michigan, and Mrs. A. Knave, Springfield, Ohio.

—In selecting Mr. Isley to succeed Col. Ralston the Prime Minister said he gathered from expressions in the press that public opinion generally took it for granted the Nova Scotia minister would be promoted.

—Referring to Mr. Isley's career in Revenue services, and his several periods as acting Finance Minister, Mr. King said "his ability as administrator in the years that he has been a member of the cabinet has gained for him an enviable reputation in all parts of Canada."

—Col. Gibson, head of a prominent Hamilton legal firm, has been leading the business organizations. He entered Parliament first in the Dominion elections last March. From the first his name was mentioned frequently as a likely choice for a cabinet post.

—Ever since Mr. Macdonald became Premier of Nova Scotia in 1923, the age of 43, he has been mentioned from the beginning as a likely Dominion Cabinet member. He has been rumored as a possible national leader of the Liberal party.

—Mr. King told of the difficulties of obtaining men of ability outside Parliament to become ministers for advisory or executive tasks with the Government. The only consideration was "the single criterion of ability," he said.

—"No political, partisan or personal considerations have diverted us from getting the most suitable man available for the particular job required to be done."

—But for Cabinet Ministers it was necessary to have men who were in sympathy with the Government and who would not create any discussion within Government ranks at such a critical time.

—"I have come to the conclusion that, for the present, at least, the most effective use can be made of men without previous experience of public life by bringing them in to assist in the administration in an administrative or advisory capacity rather than by their inclusion in the ministry itself," Mr. King said.

—Appointed from Liberal ranks greeted the name of each minister by the only opposition expression of approval came from Mr. Hanson when he praised Mr. Macdonald

—associated with the war effort. Conservative leader Hanson followed with a declaration that the Prime Minister's statement was an "extraordinary effort to bolster up in the minds of the people of Canada the shattered fortunes of his government."
