(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The farmers have opened their campaign to bring the acceptance of Ford's Muscle Shoals offer. Declaring that cheap fertilizer is essential to the agricultural section of the country, and that Ford's plan is the only one which would obtain cheap nitrates, the American Farm Bureau Federation, in a letter to members of Congress, strongly urges acceptance of the Ford plan.
