WHEEL STOLEN.—A citizen of Charlottetown is minus his bicycle through no fault of his own. He went into the Post office some evenings ago to get his mail leaving his bicycle at the door. On going out he could not find his wheel anywhere, and it is still missing. The guilty party or parties are being carefully sought for.

INWARD TRAINS.—The eastern express arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 9.35 a.m., five minutes late; the eastern accommodation at 6.00 p. m., twenty minutes late, the southern at 10.10 a.m., twenty-five minutes late; the Cape Traverse at 10.05 a.m., ten minutes late and the western accommodation at 12.00 noon twenty minutes late.

THE MARKETS.—The Charlottetown markets were very well attended yesterday and business was brisk in some respects. Spring lamb sold at from \$1.00 to \$1.50; mutton at 12 to 16 per lb, rhubarb at 4 cents per lb; lettuce at 5 per bunch; spinach at 10 per lb; and radish at 5 cents per bunch. The itemized list appears elsewhere.

STREAMER ARRIVES.—The S. S. City of Sydney arrived here Monday forenoon from Montreal, and docked at Buntain Bell & Co's wharf. She had a large general cargo and 21 passengers. She sailed at 2 a. m. Tuesday morning for St. John's, Newfoundland, via Sydney. Her outward cargo consisted of 50 head of cattle, 4 horses, 3300 bags of potatoes, 500 bags of oats, 30 Pkgs of butter 80 pieces of hardwood plank. And sundry other cargo.

FIFTH GENERATION.—Congratulations are being showered on Mr. and Mrs. J. Verner Moore, Westmorland, on the arrival at their home of Wednesday, June 4th, of a fine baby boy. This baby is a very important one as he ushers in the fifth generation, all of whom still survive. Mrs. Henry Wadman, of Crapaud, now in her 86th year, is the great grand grandmother; Mrs. David Lowther North Carleton, is the great grandmother; and Mrs. C. E. Lowther Crapaud is the grandmother, the baby's mother being her daughter.

JUST AN INCIDENT.—Last evening about 7.30 a horse attached to a lumber laden cart, which had been left standing for a considerable time in front of the McKinnon Drug Store, Charlottetown, thinking he had waited long enough for his driver started on a tour up Great George Street. The animal had almost gained a block when the driver or appeared upon the scene and halted the occupant of a passing wagon to stop his erring beast. One of the residents along the street reached the offender first, however, and held him till the owner came up. Had he not been missed just then the horse would probably have been walking yet.

RACES AT JOHNSTON'S RIVER. There is to be a horse race meeting at Johnston's River on Tuesday next, the 18th inst. It is being promoted by the farmers and residents of that place, and a good deal of interest is being evinced in it, even among some of the city folk, for whom the event will no doubt provide the occasion for an enjoyable little outing. There are to be two or three races of various classes, and probably the most interesting event will be that race which is to be confined to farmers purely, in which farm horses will be raced. The prize offered for this event is a cream separator of the value of \$75. The races will take place on the Johnston's river track, and will commence at about two o'clock in the afternoon.

BRIGADE INSPECTION.—The annual inspection of the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade will take place in Charlottetown at Victoria Park, this week. The inspecting officer will be Colonel H. E. Borehall, the Inspector of Artillery in Canada. He is due to arrive in Charlottetown from Quebec on Wednesday night. The inspection will commence on the following afternoon at four o'clock, when the full Brigade will be inspected. The Brigade, the full strength of which is 280 of all ranks, will be under the command of Lieut. Col. A. G. Peake. Afterwards in the evening, No. 3 Battery will be inspected at the mounted gun drill, and on the following evening, Friday, No. 4 Battery will be put through the same order of drill. This will complete the inspection and the inspecting officer will leave the city on the following morning.

The Supreme Court reversed the decision of the lower courts in the Minnesota rate case, and decided in favor of the state. Railways operating in Minnesota must pay three million overcharges to the State. The Attorney General disapproves both the Union and Southern dissolution plans, but will not insist on a receivership. The consensus of opinion seems to be that the market must discount the unfavorable effect of the decision. The weather in the cotton belt is unsettled.
