pleasure to affect to his being conscious of the fact. Further the control, thus gained by exercise, can be lost through disease. Offer a glass of spirits to a confirmed drunkard. He, in virtue of his undetaking, may wish to control the impulse to drink; but it proves too late. What part do these facts play in the drama of life? How does the possession and use of the will effect the condition of the individual man?

The desire to know seizes upon a boy who has been born blind. Because he is possessed of this faculty of sense in their primary condition but, by enlarging the scope of such senses he may project himself into fields that were previously closed and so extend his correspondence with the world about him into higher forms, developing thereby wider powers. And this power of extension is general. Dissatisfied with the range of vision possessed by the eye, human desire, through the will, has led men to invent an artificial extension of it—the microscope—whereby a whole world of living organisms which play an all important part in man's life and happiness, but of whose existence he had no previous knowledge, has been unveiled. Compare the man sitting in London and making his will operative on the instant in all the centers of thought and action in the world with primitive man whose power went no further than his own arm could reach and you may dimly discern what the determination of will in definite directions has done. Nor can we place any limits to such extension of man's powers. The development of another organ of sense, the conquest of death may be possible. This is true of those who will to aspire.

But some men elect to expend most of not all of their activities in the gratification of animal appetites. Again we note that the organs called into action absorb in ever increasing degree the energy of the man. Satisfied with sensuous feelings, not caring to enquire into their nature and significance, such permit their higher perceptive faculties to atrophy for want of exercise, and in consequence the life of the man may rise little above that of the brute. Or consider a less apparent but even more deplorable case of failure. A man centers all his desires upon obtaining a knowledge of the properties of matter. In pursuit of such desire he calls into activity all his intellectual faculties, bringing them into a high state of efficiency. But in so doing he unwarrantably neglects all other faculties of his being. He gives no thought to families or social relationship. His fellow men are to him aggregations of Carbon, Nitrogen, Oxygen, Hydrogen &c. Love, Sympathy, Fellowship Aspirations are to him mere words. In the wide field of human emotion and aspiration, in which is hidden the mystery of the destiny of the race, he has consciously no part or lot. To him it is as though it were not.

ISLAND FOXES TO PICTOU—Mr. John Christie, Pictou, who has been in the city for some time past, leaves by the Earl Grey this morning on return to his home. While here Mr. Christie purchased some beautiful foxes with which he will stock his ranch at Pictou Landing. The purchase of the foxes was made through the Canada Fox Exchange.

INCORPORATED—Letters Patent have been granted by the Governor-in-Council, in respect of the following companies:—The Three Rivers Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., with a capital stock of \$72,000; The Black Fox Canneries Limited, with a total capital stock of \$100,000; The Delaney Smith Silver Black Foxes, Limited, with a total capital stock of \$65,000; the "Sterling Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., with a total capital of \$99,000; and the "Tryon Black Fox Co., Ltd., with a total capital stock of \$60,000.

EXTENDING CAPITAL—The applications of The Murray Harbour Black and Silver Fox Ranching Co., Ltd., and The Victoria Farm Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., for supplementary Letters Patent in order to increase their capital stock have been granted by the Governor-in-Council. In the case of the first named company their capital, which is \$50,000 at present is being tripled and will thus be of the value of \$150,000, while in the other instance the company's capital is being increased from \$175,000 to \$250,000.

REV. GEO. DUNCAN—The following from a Montreal Paper will be of interest to Mr. Duncan's friends in Charlottetown. A despatch received Friday says Mr. Duncan accepted the call referred to. It is understood that Rev. George Duncan, of St. Guthbert's, Edinburgh, will accept the call given him by St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church (Church of Scotland), Montreal. Mr. Duncan is a distinguished graduate of Glasgow University. He has published treatises on the essences, and also on the modern theories of the Resurrection. He was born in Canada, his father having been long in the ministry there. St. Andrew's at Montreal is the only remaining charge of the original Scots Church of Scotland unincorporated with the Union of Presbyterian Churches in Canada, but it is expected that it will probably join the union shortly.

HOME NURSING—The third of a series of talks in Home Nursing given to the students of the Household Science Department on the "Short Course" was on the making of beds. The differences between the conventional, the medical, the surgical and fracture beds were brought out in a practical demonstration in which the members of the Class were deeply interested. A general talk followed on the danger of unused bedrooms and the necessity of having bed linen thoroughly aired. Thursday morning the subject of Sanitation was taken up, particularly the responsibility of the housekeeper for the health of the family. Stress was laid on the importance of pure air and thorough ventilation; the different methods of heating with the advantage of each; the water supply of country homes and the precautions to be taken against contamination from various sources. The disposal of waste matters was also taken up, dwelling especially on the simplicity and efficiency of the dry earth system. Methods were given for the sanitary disposal of garbage, tin cans, etc., leading up to the care of the back yard. In short, the talk was a summary of cleanliness which is the best and only means for the preservation of the health of one's own and one's neighbor's household.
