Anglicans Protest Against Turk Rule

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—On behalf of eighty-two American bishops it was announced here by Bishop David H. Greer, of the Episcopal Church, the following message has been cabled separately to the Archbishops of Canterbury and York:

"With utmost horror we hear a sinister rumor of the possibility of continuance of Turkish suzerainty over unhappy Armenia. Through your lordship we ask that the Anglican church do their utmost to prevent repetition of so hideous a crime. The honor of our churches and of the allied democracies demands Armenia be unconditionally liberated from Turkish rule and restored to her own people.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. COLIN CAMPBELL

Mr. Colin Campbell, a well-known figure in agricultural, fishing, social and political life, of North Lake, passed away on Friday last after only a few days illness. Mr. Campbell was recently appointed a Commissioner for taking acknowledgements to deeds, etc., by the Provincial Government. He had the contract for Rural Route No. 1 Elmira. He was about 65 years of age and had a wife and grown-up family. Two of his sons were at the front one making the supreme sacrifice about two years ago.

RAYMOND KELLY

The familiar face of the late Raymond Kelly, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Ambrose Kelly, of Shamrock, Lot 27, is hidden forever from his relatives and numerous acquaintances. Raymond was ever ready with his witty remarks to amuse his listeners, but with his wit were constantly associated honesty, morality, uprightness and kindness to his associates, who will ever cherish well his memory. His good qualities cannot too highly be extolled. When only very young his mother became a helpless invalid and a heavy responsibility rested on his young shoulders. Being the only child, and his father having other duties to attend to, he took the place of a son and daughter combined and did his part manfully as a loving and dutiful son. The death of this young man would have been in one less preparatory appallingly sudden; to him it was the swift passage into union with the Master whom he had served with such perfection. Sunday last he contracted a bad cold which soon developed into pneumonia, and early on Friday morning, Dec. 20th, the end came at the early age of 18 years. His funeral, so touching, took place on Saturday the 21st, at St. Malachias Church, Mass of Requiem chanted by Father McIntyre, being attended by a vast concourse of people, both Catholic and non-Catholic. The pall-bearers were his cousins, John, Ambrose, Louis and John Campbell, Ray Mulligan and A. Hines. His mortal remains were then laid to rest in St. Malachias cemetery, Kinkoro, Rev. J. J. McDonald officiating at the grave. The heart-felt sympathy of the whole community goes out to his heart-broken parents, who have the consolation of knowing that he will be interred for them before the Throne of Mercy. May his soul rest in peace.

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Young Officer Dies In Convalescent Home

Death for the first time entered the new Soldiers Convalescent Hospital, Charlottetown, yesterday morning when after a weeks illness of pneumonia Sergeant Stephen J. McNeill, the dispensing chemist of the hospital, passed away. The late Sergeant McNeill was a great favorite in the hospital and among the friends he made during his residence in Charlottetown; efficient and capable in his profession, kind, courteous and obliging to his fellow officers and men, his death is sorely felt by all. During his illness all the skill and care that the hospital could bestow were given him; the medical officers, the matrons and nurses stayed by his night and day doing everything for him that skill and loving care could suggest, but despite it all and to the great sorrow of all death came. His father and mother Mr. Neil P. McNeill, Town Clerk of Glace Bay, and Mrs. McNeill had been sent for and they arrived on Christmas night. Their son had been apparently taken a turn for the better and hopes were entertained of his recovery. On Thursday night, however, it was seen that the end was near. His parents and nurses remained with him during the night and early yesterday morning, fortified by the rites of the Roman Catholic Church, his spirit returned to Him who gave it. The remains will be forwarded this morning to Glace Bay accompanied by the grief-stricken parents who have the heartfelt sympathy of all in their sorrow. He was the eldest son, aged 25 years. A younger son and seven daughters are left to mourn.

Britain Holds Control Of Commercial Cable

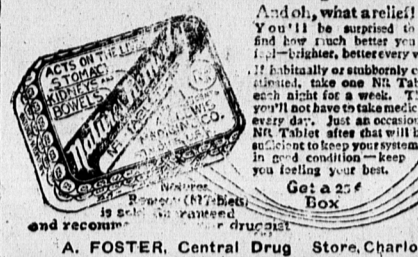
