 in Germany.  
 Munster Westf. Den. Mar.  
 15, 1917.  
 Gefangenen Lager III.  
 Dear Mother—  
 I have received one or two more of  
 your parcels they are always wel-  
 come. I look forward to their com-  
 ing very eagerly as those large cakes  
 are just the thing also the bacon  
 is good. I am sending a photo in this  
 letter. I hope you receive it all  
 right. You will see I have changed  
 to another camp. I will put my new  
 address at the end of this letter so  
 you will be sure what to put on my  
 parcels and letters. I have received  
 a parcel of clothing from Auntie  
 Lou, which you might acknowledge  
 for me. Tell her it came just in the  
 right time. Also a parcel of socks  
 from Dr. J. T. Jenkins, Charlotte  
 town. Tell Mrs. J. Bryenton I re-  
 ceived her socks in good condition  
 they were a good pair too. As Willie  
 Vessey at home now. Louise told me  
 in one of her letters they were ex-  
 pecting him. I never heard if he had  
 arrived or not.  
 I must close for this time, hoping  
 to hear from you soon, I remain your

**SOME FROSTS KEEP  
 BACK THE WHEAT.**  
 REGINA, Sask.— Heavy frosts  
 have occurred generally throughout  
 the province during the past week, ac-  
 cording to reports received during the  
 last few days by the Saskatchewan  
 Department of Agriculture.  
 Very little damage has been sus-  
 tained, however, to the wheat crop  
 beyond a slight setback to the growth.  
 All grain has made a good showing,  
 but moisture is needed generally, es-  
 pecially on spring plowing and stubble  
 lands, although nothing suffers yet  
 from the lack of rain.  
 Seeding of all grains is practically  
 completed, with the exception of a  
 little flax and oats for green food.  
 It is reported that new breaking  
 has been commenced, but summer fall-  
 low has not yet started. From the in-  
 formation at hand it appears that the  
 area sown to wheat this year will be  
 but very slightly decreased, in fact  
 not to the extent that was anticipated  
 earlier in the season.  
 Oats and flax show a most mate-  
 rial increase in acreage.
