WESTERN PRINCE CO. TEACHER'S ASSOCIATION

Green, all of whom expressed their appreciation of the valuable paper and endorsed most of the sentiments contained in it. A hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Bennett and seconded by Mr. Hughes and tendered Mr. Blanchard by the President. The session was then brought to a close.

The second session of the Convention opened at 9.30 Friday morning with an excellent paper on Nature Study by Miss Lizzie Noonan. The paper was a fine literary treat and is considered the most elaborate and classical of the kind that has ever been read before any Western Teachers' Convention. It will be published in the "Western Teacher" and is certainly a possession of no crude literary talent and her paper is undoubtedly a very masterly treatise on Nature Study. A discussion on Miss Noonan's paper was participated in by the President, Messrs Hughes, and Green and Miss Ethel Tanton. Mr. Hughes, in moving a vote of thanks to Miss Noonan, was of the opinion that French, Algebra and such subjects should be eliminated from the curriculum and that Nature Study should be substituted for these subjects. G. Green seconded the motion and the President presenting the vote of thanks to Miss Noonan.

A very exhaustive and able treatise on "Temperance" was next read by Mrs. E. J. Holman. The intense earnestness and high enthusiasm which Mrs. Holman manifested in her subject of discussion favorably impressed the audience. She dealt extensively with the great vice of intemperance and the destructive, life-destroying effects of alcohol on the different nations from time immemorial, quoting in her references, the highest medical and educational authorities of the past and present. She stated that luxury, effeminacy and intemperance caused the downfall of the Roman Empire and with the decadence of nations, it was to be deplored, sobriety has decreased. But she stated that the sobriety of Japan as a nation and the brilliant achievements accomplished by her soldiers in the present war prove, beyond a doubt, that an abstainer possesses a much greater power of endurance, a sounder body, and a clearer brain than those who are addicted to alcoholism. She felt that Prohibition must be more universally and more effectively enforced in order that the younger generation of the different nations may grow up to more useful and better citizenship. Mrs. Holman's paper was discussed by the President, G. Bennett, P. E. Hughes, Melburn Dennis and G. Green after which a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mrs. Holman.

Mrs. Holman in acknowledging the vote of thanks said that a chart, which was in possession of the W. C. T. U. of Summerside, and which showed clearly the effects of alcohol on the different organs of the body might be used to advantage by the teachers in conducting their physiology lessons.

A committee consisting of one lady of W. C. T. U. of Summerside, Mr. Bennett and P. E. Hughes, was appointed to make arrangements for the sending of the chart to the different schools of Prince County.

The last paper on the program "Some Neglected Opportunities of the Teacher" was then read by Geo. Green of French River. The subject was skillfully handled and was treated in a clear, concise, practical and able manner. In the outset he stated that opportunities are coming to us perpetually, sometimes unexpectedly, and in such various forms that it requires developed keenness on our part to detect them. He stated that too many teachers regarded themselves as merely a band of pedagogues occupying a transitory position, as it were, standing on the threshold waiting for the door to open to admit us to a more lucrative position. He thought that we must, facing the matter honestly, consider those entrusted to our charge and in justice to them we must do our duty implicitly regardless of the remuneration we receive. He referred to the lack of accuracy in school work and urged that teachers realize more fully the supreme importance and necessity of thoroughness in work. He stated that in order to gain the confidence of the pupils the teacher should come down to their level, enter into their games heartily, show them how and in what spirit to play and find out their different dispositions. On the playground such qualities as mischievousness, quarrelsome, selfishness and idleness are easily detected by the teacher.

In reference to the teaching of Scientific Temperance, he stated that our conduct outside the school room must be such as to give evidence that we really believed what we taught, that we should be solicitous in setting before the pupils an example worthy of imitation and that we should do our utmost to mould the flexible minds of boys toward the cultivation of the grand virtue of Temperance.

He then stated that we should encourage the spirit of patriotism in the children and impress more fully upon their minds the grandly grand motto of duty we receive. For instance, he contrasted the former greatness of our Empire, with its present, and he stated that we should produce a spirit of loyalty and inspire pupils with a feeling of love and respect for our glorious nation.

In conclusion Mr. Green deplored the fact that a decided lack of courtesy is manifested by children towards their superiors. In this respect, the teacher should at all times set a proper example for the pupils. He should endeavour to win their good graces and by showing his appreciation of their little acts of thoughtfulness and kindness, would be the means of greatly cultivating the quality of common civility. Above all we should not appear distant and unnatural towards our pupils, we should speak in a conversational tone of voice, secure their confidence and in sum we must work with the object of making school life happy as

rendered and the hearty response which followed showed that it was highly appreciated by the audience. Father Burke, though unexpectedly called upon to take Dr. Anderson's place on the program owing to the latter's absence, read a very practical paper on "Forestry" and delivered an able address on "The Consolidation of schools," which sparkled with his usual wit, force, and eloquence. The well rendered quartette by Misses Leard, Wisner, Wortman and Leard was warmly enjoyed and they responded with the ever popular "Good Old Summer Time." The readings of Misses McElroy, Agnew and Seales were excellent and inspiring and fully merited the vociferous accolades which they received. Miss Seales, in particular, possessed an extraordinary talent of a high order and put into her tragical reading such expression, deflection, force and eloquence that she really seemed imbued with something of the proud Spartan spirit of old. Master Doiron, in his violin selections, was at his best and the other solos and readings were well rendered and attentively listened to. Mrs. Doiron ably acted as accompanist and her part itself in the program was a musical treat.


