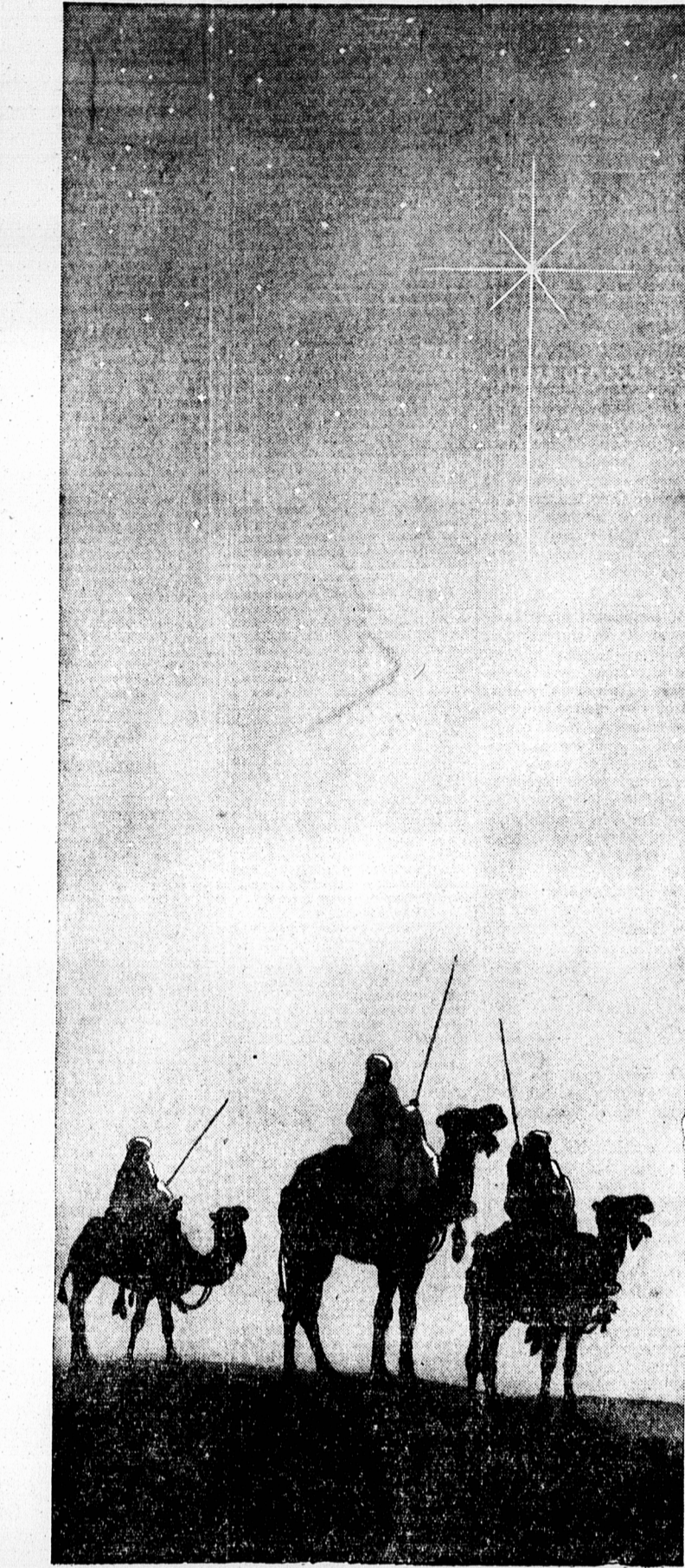
greater part of her life. In recent years however, she made her home with her son, William Carew, at Hunter River.

Favorite hymns were sung by the United Church choir, "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," and "Abide With Me". Mr. MacQuarrie paid a fitting trib- uto to her life and spoke words of comfort and exhortation from Job 5:26, "Thou shalt come to thy grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in, in his season."

The pallbearers were Messrs. Joseph MacPherson, Murdoch Cut-cliffe, Frank Bagnall, William Mac- Dougal, Willard Sellar, and John Spence. The interment took place in the United Church cemetery at Wheatley River, and the service at the grave was conducted by Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie.
