HERMIT PRIEST ON LONELY LEPER ISLE

Brother Dutton, hermit priest of Molokai, the leper island of the Hawaiian group, recently celebrated his 79th birthday and his 36th year of labour among the exiled inhabitants of the colony on the rock-bound peninsula of Kalawao, writes Reuter's correspondent at Honolulu.

He has never set foot off the lonely isle since his arrival there 36 years ago to work with Father Damien.

Once a soldier, he retired with the rank of Captain, after the American Civil War. He was "debonair, a lover of the pleasures of life; a Beau Brummel, and he sowed his wild oats until he was 35 years old." Then he concluded that "his life had been wasted and he must salvage it through penance."

As a convert to Catholicism, he was baptised at the Trappist monastery at Gethsemane, Kentucky. He determined to "bury himself from the world, and to spend the remainder of his days self abnegation."

The deceased appeared to be in unusually good health yesterday and during the evening had been doing some shingling on the barn at his residence and members of the family had remarked the high spirits. On retiring he seemed to be as well as usual and made no mention of feeling ill. He had been talking to his wife ten minutes before he passed away.

The late Mr. White was twice married, his second wife being formerly Miss Belle Keith of Havelock. Six sons and three daughters by his first wife survive him.

The sons are Seymour, of Litchfield, Maine; Beecher and Russell in the West; Bert, in the United States; Mills, of Sussex, and Ora, of Lewisville.

The daughters are Mrs. W. T. MacLesse, Mrs. John H. Steeves, and Mrs. Orin, L. Gould, of Moncton. Two brothers, Messrs. Henry and Ready White, of P. E. Island, and one sister, Mrs. Power, of Malden, Mass., also survive.

SAVAGES' STRANGE PIANOS

During a recent tour in Africa Prince Arthur of Connaught was greeted by the most amazing effects on the part of a native band.

There was only one instrument, a huge xylophone, many yards in length, upon which a score of blacks whacked and banged to their hearts' content, says Tit Bits.

These at one end pounded small pieces of wood, which gave out high notes, while pieces of considerable size supplied the bass tones. A few empty petrol tins placed here and there gave drum effects.

As a rule, the savage prefers something that he can bang, but any noise is better than none. In the East, wild music is played on pipes made of bamboo, while hollow grounds of various sizes provide the African savage with home-grown flutes, clarionets and bassoons.

Sometimes he will arrange them so that they form a kind of piano. He sits surrounded by a circle of dried fruit, whose hollow skins give out high or low notes, according to their size, as he taps them with his fingers.

Basspipes are not peculiar to England. You will find them in almost any hilly country. If of man is walking uphill he naturally gets out of breath, and he needs an instrument that will play itself when he has no wind left.

Beau Brummel's Role

English and Americans have in the past objected to the French cut of men's clothes even more than they have to the fancy colors. Tailors say the English cut to the measure of the man's body, which was Beau Brummel's rule.

Americans often say that English tailors do not fit a man's body close enough. The English retort that Americans try to improve a man's real shape by playing up the waist when his hips are too broad or padding deficient shoulders. Both object to French tailors in that they begin by cutting the material to fit loose and then trim down to successive try-ons.

For the outsider who only looks at the finished result when the man is dressed in his new clothes the present difference seems to be this: The French give a man a long waist sloping out below even in a sack coat. In the cutaway and evening suits they study graceful falling lines and outlines such as they do in ladies' gowns. English tailors do not seem to have the eye for that and no doubt, condemn it as theatrical.

John Wesley said he did not see why the devil should have all the good tunes, and so it is hard that women should have all the grace and harmony in clothes. It was not so when Henry of Navarre wore a plume in his hat and a silk coat of many colors with slashed sleeves and laces. If the French succeed in dressing men we may yet see their artistic qualities in clothes worn in New York and even in London. For mere fit American taste is like that of the French, who find, however, that American clothes are a little standardized, that is, too much alike without enough attention to the individual's personality.

NEW GULF STREAM MYSTERY

Recent investigations in Britain in connection with the herring industry have disclosed the fact that the Titanic is invading the

North Sea. Working from Lowestoft up the coast roughly to Scarborough, and thence on a course straight across the sea 200 miles N. E. north of the Dogger, the scientists took at intervals of 20 miles samples of the water layers from the surface to the bottom, and found that there was a quite abnormally large amount of Atlantic water in the deeper parts of the sea, and at the same time an unusual deficiency of coastal water, which is ascribed to the very low rainfall. Atlantic water is detected by its high degree of salinity, its temperature, and the constitution of its plankton, which is the minute life, animal and vegetable, that forms the food of fishes. The cause of this huge inflow of Atlantic water is not known. The scientists have no doubt that the herrings have been affected in some way by the phenomenon. But what has happened to the herrings in certain parts of the North Sea has not yet been discovered.
