FRANCE NEEDS WAR CREDITS.

Chamber of Deputies (B): Asked to Vote Another 39,000,000 Francs to Carry Operations.

PARIS, Oct. 3.—When the Chambers reassemble the Government will publish a yellow book on China and ask for an extra credit of 39,000,000 francs (\$7,803,700).
 The Chamber of Deputies has already voted 19,000,000 francs (\$3,800,000) and during the vacation the Government opened another credit of 12,000,000 francs (\$2,400,000). The total credit for the Chinese operations is, therefore, 70,000,000 francs (\$14,000,000).

THE BAPTIST CONFERENCE.

The Baptist churches of the Island held their Quarterly Conference with the church at Dundas on Monday and Tuesday last. Beautiful weather tended towards the success of the meeting. The following ministerial delegates were present—Pastor Spurr of Pownall, pastor Hooper of Cavendish, Pastor Warren of Montague, Pastor Raymond of Charlottetown, and Pastor Shaw of Dundas. The laymen of the denomination were represented by Jacob Dockendorf and A. D. Matheson of Dundas; John Nicholas and Anthony Head of Annandale and Peter E. Campbell of Montague.

On Monday evening there was a public platform meeting at which addresses were given by Pastors Warren and Hooper.

Tuesday morning was devoted to general church business. The Baptists of the Maritime Provinces are taking steps to raise, in addition to the \$30,000 which they are now raising for their Educational Institutions at Wolfville; \$50,000 for Home and Foreign Missions. The amount of this latter sum allotted to the Island Baptists is \$3,000 which is to be secured by pledges covering a period of four years.

At the afternoon session reports were given from the different churches represented which showed some degree of growth and cause for thankfulness and hope.

Rev. A. E. Hooper read a carefully prepared paper: "Does our service of song need improvement?"

At the evening session there was a large gathering representing all the denominations of the community. Pastor W. H. Warren read a most interesting paper on "Pastoral discouragements and how to meet them." Pastor Raymond gave a talk on "The Bible," showing our obligations to the Scriptures for the high degree of civilization now enjoyed in this and other English speaking countries, and urging a more general and careful study of the "Book" in our homes. Evangelist Saml. who is at present employed in special services at Annandale, was present during part of the time. The Conference will hold its next session at Marshfield, St. Peter's Road, on the second Monday and Tuesday of December.
