The Plague Of Women.

As was to be expected, Dr. Treves, the famous surgeon, has been receiving a good deal of attention because of his statement that there were two plagues for the sick soldiers in South Africa, the plague of flies and the plague of women. In replying to these Dr. Treves points out that he could hardly be accused of saying anything against the women nurses of the army professional or amateur, as he was the first to take out a number of women nurses to the war. He has nothing but praise for the women who are really there caring for the sick. The "plague" refers to the women of the "smart set" who went out to find some new excitement and who now fill up all the hotels at Cape Town, so that there is not room for an invalid officer. When dinner parties, picnics and junketings pull they organize hospital parties, and all day long through the wards of the hospitals, interfering with the work of the doctors and disturbing the patients. The doctor seems to have the best of his critics.

Torpedo Boats.

In no department of service under any government—even the Foreign Office is not excepted by naval men—are so many secrets to preserve as in the torpedo service; and with such absolute exactitude is every article connected with torpedo stores kept that men have been removed from employment and reduced in rank because a single common iron bolt—of course, of a particular kind—worth the minutest fraction of a cent, has been missing.

Just at this time England is unusually strict. Every pattern of tool, bolt, pin, screw, spanner, wheel or cog has its own separate locker at the great depot at Portsmouth, where there are always 1,000 torpedoes of the latest kind, worth about \$2,500,000 as to mere prime cost. Every item must be produced on demand at a moment's notice. On one occasion, when the stock-taking took place, it was found that instead of 5,000 little screws—these particular screws cost 5 cents a gross—being accounted for by the man who was told off to count them there were only 4,997. An animated correspondence took place about three screws, and certain important changes were made in the department in consequence of their loss.

The incident is cited in a government hand-book, distributed among torpedo officers and men alone, to convince them of the importance of not losing sight of a single object that could give a clue to certain secrets. When a torpedo is from any cause broken up every part of it is separately melted or crushed to pieces.

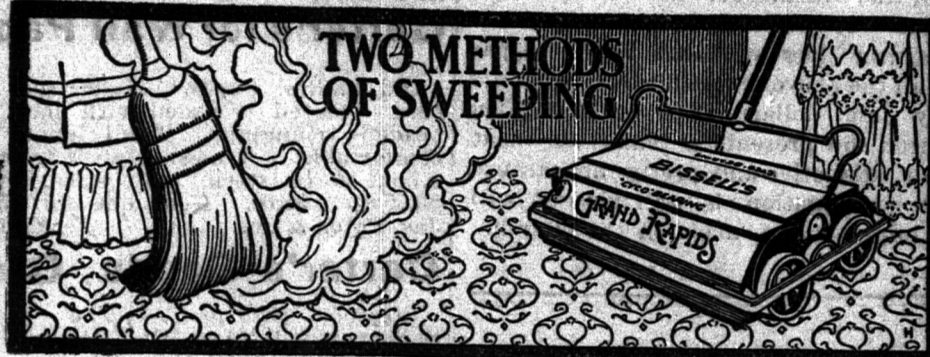

Vital Statistics.

Sir.—In all the large cities of the United States and England, there is a system of keeping proper track of births and deaths. The city of Montreal is considering the matter and a draft of a by-law has been placed before the City Council.

The draft of the by-law was as follows: "It shall be the duty of every qualified medical practitioner, or midwife, or, in their absence, the parent or parents, or any other person present at the birth of any child born within the limits of the city of Montreal, to sign and give a written report within five days after such birth to the Medical Health Officer, stating as far as possible the particulars required in the form provided by the said officer, with such additional information as may from time to time be required by him on forms to be supplied for this purpose."

2. "In registering the birth of an illegitimate child, it shall not be lawful for the name of any person to be entered as the father unless at the joint request of the mother and the person acknowledging himself to be the father."

3. "Any person violating or contravening any of the provisions of the present by-laws or who knowingly or willfully makes or causes to be made a false statement touching any of the particulars required to be reported and entered under the by-law, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder of the city of Montreal, be liable to a fine, or, in default of an immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment, to be fixed by the Recorder's Court at its discretion. The fine nevertheless not to exceed \$40, and the imprisonment not more than two months for each and every offence (Sect. 56, by-law 105.)"

4. "A fee of 45 cents shall be paid to the person making a complete report of a birth as described in section 1."

5. "The penalties mentioned in this by-law shall be payable one moiety to the party giving information and one moiety to the municipality."

Should not the system be adopted in our own city? In fact the system might be extended to take in the whole province. If it were, then a proper account could be kept of the increase or decrease in population. I think the system is worthy of consideration by our city fathers.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And Its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing, at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company, two Electric Light plants, and a street railway in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shaded streets, its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water, and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' pride. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packer establishments in the Dominion. On its west side is Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains, and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has about 4000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedoune Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Russ and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken, and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel. In Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner, in Tignish the Railway; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald, and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View, at Stanhope, Mutchers, and Cliff. At Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Seaside; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaforth, and at Pownall, Florida.

In addition to these already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.
