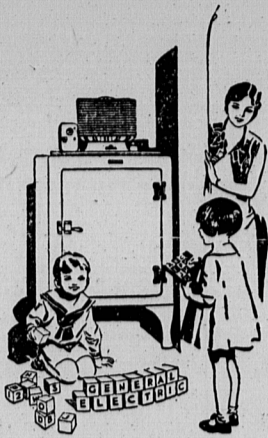

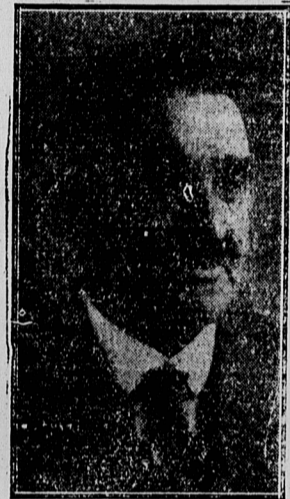

OTTAWA, June 22.—The end of the third week of the campaign finds Conservative headquarters in the capital even more optimistic than at the beginning over the result of the contest. It is claimed that each succeeding report from the several Provinces gives more justification for confidence in a decisive Conservative victory. From the beginning the Government's defeat has been admitted here, and the real question was whether the Conservatives would win a decisive victory or would there be a repetition of the stalemate of 1925. At Conservative headquarters there is now no doubt a decisive victory will be won.
