Drillon Scores Twice As Leafs Defeat Canucks 4-3; Amerks Down Red Wings

MONTREAL, Feb. 12—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs rallied three times tonight to defeat Montreal Canadiens 4-3 in a speedy, hard-hitting National Hockey League game.
The victory, gained on Gordie Drillon's second goal of the night, gave Leafs three of a possible four points in the home and home weekend games between the teams. They tied 3-3 in Toronto last night.
Canadiens gave one of their best home displays of the season before a crowd of close to 9,000 and held the lead three times, but a tripping penalty to Paul Haynes late in the third period gave Leafs the break they needed and Drillon rapped in the winner.

Rangers Win Close Game From Bruins

BOSTON, Feb. 12—(CP)—A late rally that netted two goals failed by a single tally to save Boston Bruins from a beating tonight and the National Hockey League leaders lost a 3-2 verdict to New York Rangers, their first defeat in nine games.
The game was loosely played before 16,500 fans, the biggest home crowd of the season, at the Boston Garden.
Although the Bruins outshot Lester Patrick's sharpshooters, they were three goals down until the last four minutes of play, thanks to the consistent play of Alex Shubicky and the Colville brothers.
Shubicky, who scored twice, caged his first tally unassisted during the second period and slapped another puck past goalie Frankie Brimsek in the third with the cooperation of the Colville lads. The brothers then combined for the third Ranger tally, Neil countering Mac's assist.
Threatened with a whitewashing before a packed house—the game was sold out last Thursday—the Bruins managed to catch the Rangers short-handed with four minutes to go and Milt Schmidt rapped in Eddie Shore's assist. That defence star and little Bobby Bauer handled the puck before Woody Dumart counted again for the Bruins.

Canucks Surge From Behind To Tie Leafs

TORONTO, Feb. 12—(CP)—Reaffirming their determination to catch a place in National Hockey League playoffs, the last-place Montreal Canadiens surged from behind in a late drive Saturday night to earn a 3-3 overtime tie with Toronto Maple Leafs.
The Habibians were kept in the game until the last four minutes by a sensational goal-tending of Willie Oude. Then Babe Siebert, kingpin of the Canadian defence, paced four forwards in a desperate attack that brought two goals in 22 seconds.
Trailing by three goals with 16 minutes of the second period gone, the visitors narrowed the gap on a pretty score by Herbie Cain. The Leafs resumed a long barrage on the Montreal nets immediately and it wasn't until the dying minutes, when Siebert whipped a shot past Turk Broda, that the Canadian defence really became content. Then Black Cat Johnny Gagnon sped another drive by the Leaf goal tender on a smart passing play, and through the overtime session Canadiens held an edge in territorial play.

SYDNEY, N. S. Feb. 12—(CP)—Tic Williams, Sydney Millonaires speedy centre, scored 24 goals and got 16 assists in the Cape Breton Hockey League's regular schedule of 24 games to take the leadership, according to the final standing released tonight.
Williams who came here from Charlottetown, was 14 points ahead of his nearest rivals, George Appleby and Irving MacGibbon also of Sydney. Their team finished in first place and will meet Glace Bay Miners in the play-off. MacGibbon had 17 goals and nine assists while Appleby, formerly of Moncton Maroons, collected 19 assists and nine goals.
Jack Fritz of Sydney drew 10 penalties and spent 51 minutes in the "cooler" to take the lead in penalties. The Sydney team was the most penalized, receiving 118 for a total of 289 minutes.

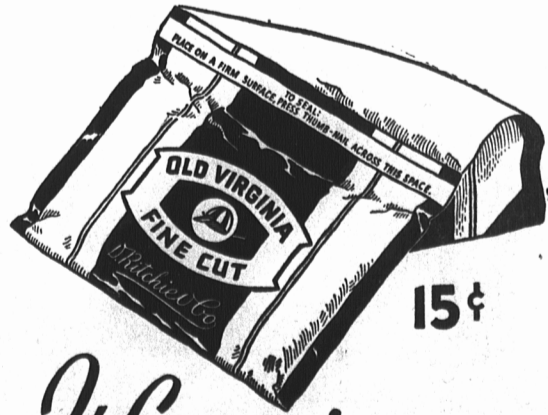
Mounties Win Hoop Game
