E. M. SIPREL returned to-day from attendance at the twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Ontario Mutual Life Assurance Co., in Waterloo, Ontario. The company's business for the past was the largest in its history and the increase in assurance in force greater than in any Canadian Company with a single exception. The funds of the Ontario Life now exceed \$4,000,000, its interest income alone being more than sufficient to pay the death claims.—St. John Globe.

THE GUARDIAN is in receipt of a marked copy of the Anglo American published in Boston, from a friend in Boston. In an article on Canadian summer resorts it treats its readers to a review of the climate of Canada by Dr. P. H. Bryce, M. A., Sec. Provincial Board of Health of Ontario, who is recognized by the medical profession of America as an eminent expert on the subject. After reviewing the climate of the different provinces, it says: "The island of Prince Edward, our easternmost province, though she receives the shock of the cold breakers from the north, is one of the most fertile spots in all Canada, growing enormous crops of potatoes and oats, and reaps a sea harvest in the clear, cold waters off her coast such that her hospitable people have been enabled to make a dozen centres on the coasts of the tight little Island delightful places for recuperation and pleasure, not more because the ozonized, cool air gives appetite and a relish to existence, than because of the constant invitation it gives whether to riding and driving over sea-sands and the beautiful country roads with their long, winding lines marked in red, from the new red sandstone soil of which the Island is formed, or in yachting or going to sea with the fishermen in their dories."

As the company have made rapid progress with their new factory which will undoubtedly prove as represented, to be the model factory, and as Mr. Carver is a competent maker of both cheese and butter they will not need to fear of the quality of their product.—Mr. J. H. Jenkins, of Bethel, Mr. Carver, 1st assistant will accompany him. There was received at the Hillsboro Dairy station last week 42,800 lbs. of milk, from which was manufactured 1,690 lbs. of Gilt edge, a large amount of the butter is being disposed of to customers in Charlottetown and as a first-class article is being made, the highest market price is attained. Mr. E. L. Head is the manufacturer. Before beginning to manufacture cheese this season, the company intend having placed in the curing room an ice box and their general renovations made to the plant.
