-SIDE WATER FRONT -The water front at Summerside presented a very gay appearance on Empire Day. The Government steamer Brant, Capt. Kelly, was decked with flags and bunting in honour of Victoria Day. The S. S. Athens, Capt. Norstrom, came into port during the morning with a cargo of 3,000 tons of fertilizer for the Associated Shippers. The Athens came up from Charlottetown under the pilotage of Captain Sampson Grady of Summerside. She is a Norwegian boat from Bergen and is capable of doing 14 1-2 knots. She will probably remain in Summerside until Sunday morning. There are about one hundred men employed in the unloading of the cargo. The S. S. Oliva came into port Friday morning with a cargo of flour from the Great Lakes. There is about 400 tons of flour on feed. This boat is unloading at Holman's wharf and is employing about thirty men. The flour is being stored at the Robin Hood warehouse on Holman's wharf, for distribution to different parts of Prince County. The Oliva expects to finish unloading by Saturday and will sail for Charlottetown and later for Halifax. The S. S. Brant left early Friday morning for West Cape to finish placing out the buoys. The car ferry, Charlottetown was sighted from Summerside going up the Straits on her way to Montreal for repairs.-S

When the Bay State Circuit opens at Goshen, June 5, the followers of light harness racing will have an opportunity to see a few of the 1934 Juveniles in action. Eight of the leaders in the winter training camps are named in the two year old trot for this meeting and the best of them on race day will start. Of this group the fillies Chic and Harrington and Goshen by will start. Chic is owned by Martin B. Dodd of Norfolk. Conn. she is a sister to Sybil Volo 2:06 and worked in 2:15 before leaving the Delaware track. Millie Day was also trained in the same notch. She is from the first crop of foals by Guy Day out of that splendid race mare Martine Irwin 2:03 1-4, and is owned by Henry S. Warwick, New Hamburg, N. Y.

J. C. Thompson of New York is represented by the Peter Volo colts Guardsman, a brother of Full Tilt 2:03 3-4 and Volo Arion, whose dam also produced Princess 2:12 which won last year over the New England tracks before she was sold for export. Both of them are rated as high class by Harry Bruste who developed them.

Will Hodson will pull in behind Stacy Smith's colt Pedro Tipton. He is another Peter Volo his dam being a sister to Symphronia 2:03. Last winter this colt was rated as one of the best at Longwood when he worked in 2:17. Lucre, Fex and Calumet Filomar, the three entries from the Arden Homestead Stable, were trained over the same course by Will Dickerson. Lucre is a home product by Pluto Watts. She trotted in 2:17 in March. Fex is a brother to Blue Heather 2:12 3-4 and the Calumet filly is by Trux out of a sister to Bronx 2:02 3-4.

These youngsters are further along in their work than the two year olds that are booked to start at Circuit which will get under way in June. At that point Sam Caton will appear in the Rainy Day stake behind the Athlone Guy colt Athlone's Sally Boy. He worked a mile in 2:16 at Lexington over a month ago. Valentine is also busy at the point with the clever Juvenile Senator Horn. He is by the Senator out of Rosalie Horn 2:10 and has been in 2:13 1-2. A report from Indianapolis shows that Sep Pain has a clever prospect in Greyhound by Guy Abbey out of a sister to Peter the Brewer. He has been in 2:18 and will race when the bell rings.

The Florida trained Juveniles in the White and Egan stables will also be ready to make a bid for the money at North Randall. They were given a leg up after the strenuous work at Seminole Park but are now again on their way to the races. White has a clever pair for R. J. Reynolds in Mary Taylor, a sister to Calumet Chuck 2:04, and Brookie Barnes by Peter the Brewer. He also has Belvedere, a sister to Brevere 2:03, for N. Reynolds and M'Lisa, a sister to Post Haste 2:05 1-4, for Mrs. Harvey of Cleveland. Each of them worked in 2:15 before they were shipped to Lexington. Silver King, a brother to Fred Mark 2:07, worked in 2:14 3-4. The Gayworthy fillies Gaylets and Gayburn also made a trip in 2:17 and St. Patrick, a brother to Howard McElwyn, worked in 2:17 1-2. The Sandy Flash colt Finnigan, owned by Mrs. Van Buskirk, worked in 2:17 before he was sent to Vio Fleming at Syracuse.

Fred Egan will race Tillie Tonka, a sister to Emily Stokes 2:07 1-4, for

C. W. Phellis of New York. She has been in 2:13 1-4. Her stable mate Laughing Brooke by High Noon out of Tilly Brooke 1:59 will be marked and turned out until 1935.

The high priced colts Lawrence Hanover and Prince John have been working in 2:20. The first named is a brother to Hanover's Bertha 1:59 1-2. Prince John is by Volomite out of the dam of Pretector 1:59 1-4. He is owned by Thomas Ashworth, Charlton City, Mass. Both of them are in Dr. Parsball's stable now at North Randall.

The Good Time Stable has named Miss Harris T. Walter's Sister, and Addison in the two year old trots. Miss Harris T. is by Tillyworthy out of Miss Harris M. 1:58 1-4 while Walter's Sister, as her name implies, is a sister to the American and European star Walter Dear. Like the other members of this stable they are being brought along so as to be ready for Grand Circuit engagements.
