EXPERIENCES ON TORPEDOED SHIP

Continued from Page Two.

I simply begged and implored them to let us get in, and at last I said: "Well, you might let this mother and her children for come. It doesn't matter so much for me." Some gruff voice said: "Oh! Let them come." And I threw the two children over, and I mother jumped up on the rail, and I gave her a push, for at such times you don't stand on ceremony. I felt that when she would lose her heart. Then, my friend was promptly hit over the head in some way I dragged her overboard. I remember standing on the rail and wondering whether to make a jump or not, for I had a distance of some 20 feet to make. I finally made up my mind to go and landed right in the middle of the boat. We were lowered on to another boat, and after much maneuvering we got clear. For the next thing we knew we were some hundred yards away from our doomed vessel.

This was the most thrilling part. It was a beautiful, warm, still evening, and you know how every sound carries over the water. Such a mixture, mostly of feeling and expression. Some were praying, some were singing, the latest rag-time, some singing their fate might be revealed in the vilest language. Then for a second or two all would be peace, whose dead stillness would be broken by moans and cries for help from those who were already victims of the sea. It is a heart-rending experience when you see people needing your help and you cannot reach out a hand to them. At one time it looked as though we were to be swamped by an over-crowded boat where the people were hanging on to the outside, but we managed to steer clear and made for the open sea. Here I saw the worst sights. Poor, half-starved women and children brought in, some in only their night attire, some without a stitch on their backs, some in a semi-conscious condition, some bruised and beaten from the buffeting they had had. I was not as unfortunate as some, and when we were partly covered in oil, I was most frozen, her hair hanging in tatters over her white face, and as I rubbed the life back in her she opened her eyes and said, "Oh! Here you are. You were the last person I saw helping someone over into a boat. I have prayed for your safety, and I am so glad you are all right." It did me so much good.

I cannot finish my story without telling you of our brave navy. If you will take it from an eye witness I will tell you they are the kindest, most large hearted, noblest and most daring of men. Never before have I seen anything to equal those men on the British mine-sweepers. Big stalwart seamen who you would think had no room for sympathy or feeling for others took those half clad women, un-dressed them, put them into thick warm woolen sleeping suits and put them to bed just as a well trained nurse would do. I never saw men more like women. They told us they had been scouring those very waters for six weeks, knowing that submarines lurked below and would not rest until they had their piece and we can rest assured that piece of work is done.

As in days of old when danger threatened, our "far distant storm-beaten ships" are standing between us and the ruthless aggressor. We have learned in these days of storm and stress to appreciate the value of sea power not only as a means of maintaining the necessary supply of food, of ensuring the safety of the Empire, of keeping open all ports in the world to the Allies and closed to our enemies, but also as a means of carrying our mails back and forth.

Napoleon himself said, when imprisoned on St. Helena, "You are superior in maritime force to all the world united and who you confine yourself to that aim you will always be dreaded. Your soldiers are brave, nobody can deny it, but your marine is the real force of your country and one which while you preserve it will always render you powerful."

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falls when being lowered and all its occupants were thrown into the sea. Here it was that most of the victims of the Hesperian were lost—22 in all, 22 of the crew and 10 passengers. She managed to get him in but could not get in herself, and although someone tried to pull her in, she showed us the black impression of my man's finger tips on her arms (as he tried to pull her).
