A Toast To The Maritimes

At the recent Charter Day luncheon of the Maritime Women's Club of Montreal, at which Mrs. George R. MacLeod, an "Islander" presided and the Lady Tweedsmuir was the guest of honour and chief speaker, Mrs. Robert Bruce Marr (nee Grace Messervy of Charlottetown) proposed the toast to the Maritime in the following felicitous address:

"Your Excellency, Madam President, guests and members of the Maritime Women's Club, a toast to home; it brings to our thoughts memories almost too precious for words, memories perhaps at this time of the fragrance of our May-flower, the trailing arbutus.

"Cape Bretoners, you come from the Lakes of Bras d'Or. You have seen the water in Oldham's Bay and followed the Margaree. Gaelic is your mother tongue.

"Others hail from Halifax, town of the glory of your grand old ship, the Pauls. Many come from the South Shore, where fishermen go down to the sea in ships, to do business on the treacherous waters.

"Blomedia and the Valley bring to others stories of Evangeline, Old Port Royal and "Sam Slick". Doubtless many of you remember sailed on the good ship "Hector". You are Scotch to the core, and proud of it, and you hail from Pictou County and Pictou Academy.

"I go back through the years to 1783, and I see little ships sailing north, through the stormy waters of the Bay of Fundy, people who have left all to live under the British flag. The United Empire Loyalists founded St. John. This is the birthplace and harbour, even so is Halifax.

"We call the broad waters of the St. John. The Capital comes to view, not unlike Stratford-on-Avon, the spire of Christ Church reflecting in the still water, daisy fields and stately elms everywhere. Many of you were born and bred in this beautiful valley.

"The marshes of Tantramar, the bays of the Petitoedie, the Rocks at Hopewell, recall happy, happy days. And La Bale Chaleur, the twin Miramichi, Sugar Loaf Mountain, beckon you to a land of vines and grapes.

"We cross the water a few minutes, perhaps forty, and we near "Hopewell", the Indian name for Prince Edward Island, meaning cradled on the way, crescent-shaped it is, nestling in the protecting arms of the Gulf of St. Lawrence; who shall say the Mismis was not perfect? Ahead stand out clearly the warm rugged glory of red sandstone cliffs, crowned by a chequered pattern of many shades of green contrasting with the deep dark green of the firs. Among the fields stand the cottages, their attendant barns, all white and clean like squares of fresh washed linen. We are on "the Island" at sunset time, our journey ended. Here are roads which wind as a red ribbon up hill and down dale, with the aroma of sweet fern and wild flowers, and the scent of spruce, with here and there the hedge row.
