Survey Of Fox Industry

The Prince Edward Island Fur Pool Limited has just completed a survey of the silver fox industry in the Maritime Provinces. This in the Maritimes this season is not more than 40% of last season's pelts offerings.

At this time all markets are practically bare and recent sales have been on a better basis than at any time during the year. Ranchers can therefore reasonably expect much more satisfactory conditions this season and should hesitate in order to reach an early market. We are firmly convinced that much better prices will be available this season and that in their own interests ranchers should do nothing that will result in a recurrence of the panic conditions which prevailed in November and December of last year when thousands of pelts were sold at prices not less than 50% below the later markets.

Certain beneficial features now in process of negotiation, and therefore confidential will we believe, be announced by early December and will then undoubtedly prove to be of considerable value to Canadian producers.

The fur trade is probably not yet aware that the entire offerings this season will be so much below the quantities offered last year and will doubtless endeavour to again secure early supplies at sacrifice prices.

The Prince Edward Island Fur Pool Limited will continue to keep ranchers fully advised on any new developments. L-970.

Special Services At Trinity United Church

Special services at Trinity United Church yesterday marked the 76th anniversary of the dedication of the present building. The guest speaker was the Rev. W. M. Ryan. He was pastor of the church at the time of union in 1925 and left here in 1927. Since then he has returned.

Both commemoration and special services were largely attended and much inspiration was received from the words of the guest preacher. The words of Elijah in Kings 2:10 was the text of Rev. Mr. Ryan's morning address. In answer to Elisha's request for a double portion of his master's spirit, Elisha says it will be so if Elisha sees him after he is gone,—that is, if Elisha becomes the incarnation of Elisha's spirit. The speaker showed how this answer could be very fittingly applied to our present Church. If we imbibe the spirit of those devoted Christian men and women who laid the foundations of this church, their power will be ours too, and God's work will advance in spite of opposition and indifference. The congregation gave the special anthems, "Awake, Put on Strength"—Barrett, and "Jerusalem, My Glorious Home"—Wason. This last anthem was sung at the opening service in 1894.

In the evening, Rev. Mr. Ryan based his sermon on the two phrases, "Endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ," and "Put on the whole armour of God." The first was the challenge with which he urged us to meet effectively allure people to a Christian life, and the second is the advice which should guide their efforts. A good Christian must be wholly aggressive. There is none for the back-sitter. On this anniversary day rededicate ourselves to the great conflict with the hosts of darkness, finding our strength in Jesus Christ, who came to conquer the world's evil. A selection of the men's voices very beautifully sang, "Come, My Soul, Thy Suit Prepare"—Molay, and the choir rendered the anthems, "The Sun Shall Shine More Thy Light Day" and "O God of Love, O King of Peace."

Key Pittman, U. S. Senator Dies Suddenly

RENO, Nev., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Key Pittman, 68, chairman of the United States Senate committee on foreign relations, died in hospital here early today.

The veteran legislator, who might have entered the Senate six years earlier than he did but for his observance of a gentleman's agreement, suffered a heart attack very early today.

Although Senator Pittman was not in vigorous health when he came home to campaign successfully last Saturday, when he failed to appear at a political rally here, that his illness became known publicly.

Monday night, at the hospital and his physician, Dr. A. J. Hood, disclosed that he had been in bad health throughout the campaign.

Senator Pittman was elected to the United States Senate in 1912, for an unexpired term of four years, defeated Samuel Platt, and in last Tuesday's election—his sixth successive victory for that office.

Gov. E. P. Gaville, expressing deep regret at the Senator's death, said he had given no thought to a successor.

Key Pittman, who never ran for an office except that of United States Senator, sought that office in 1906, the year Nevada decided to try the direct primary as an experiment. Prior to that time Nevada Senators had been appointed by the State Legislature.

Pittman made a gentleman's agreement with his opponent, Geo. Nixon, Republican, that the majority of the popular vote, should have the Senate seat. Nixon polled 9,729 votes; Pittman 8,224.

But the Democrats elected a majority to the State Legislature and that body appointed Pittman to the Senate. The lawyer, however, asked the legislature to rescind its action, and appoint Nixon. The legislature acceded to his request.

Democracy in Britain Ended, Kennedy Thinks

BOSTON, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Boston Globe, in a copyright story, quotes Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to Great Britain, as saying in an interview Saturday that "democracy in England and Ireland would be the result."

"Kennedy could not be reached immediately by the Canadian Press for elaboration as to just what he meant by "national socialism."

The ambassador said the United States is interested should pursue a policy of aiding Britain "as far as we can."

"People call me a pessimist," the Globe quoted Kennedy. "I say—what is there to be gay about? Democracy is all done."

The ambassador was asked, "you mean in England or this country too?" And was quoted by the Globe as replying:

"Well, I don't know. If we get into war it will be in this country, too. A bureaucracy would take over right off. Everything we hold dear would be gone. They tell me that after 1918 we got it all back again. But this is different. There's a different pattern in the world."

"What about British democracy?" the paper said Kennedy was asked. Is there real opportunity there of the aristocracy keep a rigid class structure that keeps the common man down?"

"When there's a strong usurper from beneath you can't stop it," the paper said Kennedy replied. "You can't blame the aristocracy for keeping it down if it doesn't come up."

"Well, what does it mean to have labor men now at the centre of government?" Kennedy was asked. "It means national socialism is coming out of it," the Globe quoted Kennedy as replying.

The paper quoted Kennedy as saying that if the war spreads to Canada "we're sucked in on that, and the Monroe doctrine and all."

First British Fliers Land

AN EASTERN CANADIAN PORT.

Nov. 10.—(CP)—First large contingent of British airmen to train in Canada independently of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan disembarked here today and headed for Canadian training centres in Ontario and Western Canada after an exciting Atlantic voyage.

The airmen were in charge of Wing Cmdr. H. M. Groves who was looking forward to establishing a school "where we can have a decent chance of training them without fear of interruption."

Most of his men, he said, were in their advanced training period and only required night on to operational points on the front. Night flying training had become "very difficult" in the United Kingdom since the beginning of the mighty air raids.
