PROHIBITION CASES.—Before Mr. Arthur McQuaid, Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, on Tuesday, the prohibition cases were tried against Drs. A. A. Allan and T. V. Grant, and Mr. J. D. Knight, druggists, all of Charlottetown. The first named two, for issuing prescriptions contrary to the provisions of the Prohibition Act, and in regard to the third defendant, for selling liquor contrary to the provisions of the same law. A conviction was obtained in each case, the Magistrate remarking that there seemed to have been a wholesale giving of certificates for the procuring of liquor. Drs. Allan and Grant were each fined \$20 and costs, and Knight, \$100 and costs. Another case against Dr. Grant, on a charge similar to the first, was dismissed for want of evidence. Mr. J. D. Stewart conducted the prosecutions.

The remains will be taken to the home of his mother, Stanley Bridge, tomorrow, whence the funeral will

MACKEREL.—At the present writing the prospects for a successful mackerel season are not very encouraging. R. E. Jamieson, of the North Atlantic Fisheries, and J. C. Lewis of Barclay, Clements Co., yesterday received telegrams informing them that the American markets were glutted owing to the tremendously large catches made by the American fishing fleet. Another disturbing thought is the fact that the mackerel are this year running in mixed schools; large, medium, and small being caught together. The first mackerel to reach the Island were caught off Souris Monday.

IMPORTANT TO TEACHERS.

P. E. I. teachers, actually engaged in teaching, or who purpose teaching in this province during the next school year, who attend the session of the Summer School of Science to be held in this city July 7th to 29th, and whose record for class attendance and work is satisfactory, will in addition to free tuition receive a cash bonus of eight dollars (\$8) and a refund of the railway fare paid by them to attend the school. In addition to the above, a bonus will be given to all teachers who complete the course given at the Summer School, and successfully carry out the work in their schools. The amount of the bonus is not yet determined, but it will be a creditable one. To receive the bonus the teachers work must be favorably reported upon by the Inspector.

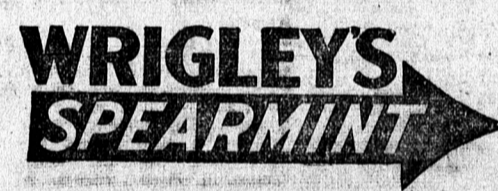
