## THE ETHICS ON A SIOUX INDIAN

There is a very notable article by a Sioux Indian, on "The Indian and the Moral Code," in the Outlook. The writer is Dr. Charles A. Eastman, whose tribal name is Ojibwa. It gives one a keen sense of the august mind of the Indian in his primeval days.

"Long before I ever heard of Christ or saw a white man I had learned from an untutored woman the essence of morality. With the help of dear Nature herself, she taught me things simple but of mighty import. I knew God. I perceived what goodness is. I saw and loved what is really beautiful. Civilization has not taught me anything better.

"As a child I understood how to give. I have forgotten that grace since I became civilized. I lived the natural life, whereas I now live the artificial. Any pretty pebble was valuable to me then, every growing tree an object of reverence. Now I worship with the white man and a painted landscape whose value is estimated in dollars. Thus the Indian rocks are ground to powder and made into artificial blocks which may be built into the walls of modern society.

"The first American mingled with his pride a singular humility. Spiritual arrogance was foreign to his nature and teaching. He has never claimed that the power of articulate speech was proof of superiority over the dumb creation; on the other hand, it is to him a precious gift. He believes profoundly in silence—the sign of a perfect equilibrium, of body, mind, and spirit. The man who preserves his selfhood even in the midst of the storms of existence—no leaf, as it were, astray on the tree, nor a ripple upon the shining pool—his, in the mind of the savage sage, is the ideal attitude and conduct of life.

"If you ask him, 'What is silence?' he will answer, 'It is the Great Mystery. The holy silence is His voice. If you ask, 'What are the fruits of silence?' he will say, 'They are self-control, true courage or endurance, patience, dignity, and reverence. Silence is the corner-stone of character.'

"Guard your tongue in youth, and the old chief Wabashaw, 'and in age you may mature a thought which will be of service to your people.'

"The moment that man conceived of a perfect body, supple, symmetrical, graceful, and enduring, in that moment he had laid the foundation of a moral life. No man can hope to maintain such a temple of the spirit beyond the period of adolescence unless he is able to curb his indulgence in the pleasures of the senses. Upon this truth the Indian built a rigid system of physical training, a social and moral code that was the law of his life.

"There was aroused in him as a child a high ideal of manly strength and beauty, the attainment of which must depend upon strict temperance in eating and in the sexual relation, together with severe and persistent exercise. He desired to be a worthy link in the generations, and that he might not destroy by his weakness the vigor and purity of blood which had been achieved at the cost of much

self-denial by a long line of ancestors.

"He was required to fast from time to time for short periods, and to work off his superfluous energy by means of hard running, swimming, and the vapor bath.

"Personal modesty was early cultivated as a safeguard, together with a strong self-respect and pride of family and race. This was accomplished in part by keeping the child ever before the public eye, from his birth onward.

"The youth was encouraged to enlist early in the public service, and to develop a wholesome ambition for the honors of a leader and feast-maker, which can never be his unless he is faithful and generous, as well as brave, and ever mindful of his personal chastity and honor."

## BOILERMAKERS STRIKE ORDERED

NEW YORK, Feb. 20—John J. Dowd, Vice-President of the International Brotherhood of Engineers, announced today that a strike of 1800 boiler makers employed by the New York Central and the Lake Shore Railroad had been ordered. The men called out were in shops between New York and Chicago.

According to Dowd, an attempt to install the piece work system on the road was responsible for the trouble. The boiler makers make from \$3.90 to \$4.10 a day.

## PARIS SCIENTIST FINDS GOUT MICROBE

Chickens with the gout form an exhibit of the Pasteur Institute in Paris when visitors are taken through the place these days. But the chickens so afflicted are believed to mark a distinct forward step in the study of the germ theory, because Prof. Metchnikoff, the distinguished scientist, believes he has succeeded in isolating a microbe responsible for this painful ailment, and it is due to experiments made by him that the chickens suffer. The chickens were fed a diet of horseflesh and this food caused the increased growth of certain microbes in the intestines and produced swelling of the joints just as occurs in gout in the human being.

# KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS 1864-1911 47TH ANNIVERSARY

Another year has been added to the long list of those which have been recorded in the history of the Order of the Knights of Pythias. Through the vast continent of North America the embers are busily engaged in preparing some suitable form of entertainment, that will be in accord with the day they celebrate.

The Knights of Pythias was instituted at Washington, D. C., on the 19th of February, 1864, and is consequently 47 years in existence. Organized as it was in the midst of one of the greatest military struggles in the history of America, by which the boom of cannon, the clash of arms, the screech of shells, and the cry of the wounded and dying proclaimed a loud that hate, malice, and envy were reaping the harvest of destruction and death. With the country in such a disrupted state the people were beginning to tire of the struggle which began in 1861, and steps were being taken to bring matters to an amicable settlement. On a distant day better things were in store for the country, and an end put to the terrible suffering the war had produced.

It was a moment of heartfelt enjoyment to the American people when the cruel war was over, when friendship and love supplanted the discordant elements of woe and war. At this time the Knights of Pythias was launched into existence, to take its place among the fraternal societies. Based upon the beautiful principles of Friendship, Charity and Benevolence it was felt by good brothers who were connected with its organization that friendship and love were about to remove from the hearts of the men the demons of malice and envy, and, if united with prudence and courage, a noble band could be bound together that would form a nucleus of a little army that would in a brief space become one of the leading agencies on earth, to spread the ennobling and purifying influences that would improve the conditions of humanity.

In a few months after Pythian Knighthood was instituted the curtain rolled up upon the last scene of the American tragedy, which the winged messenger of peace announced the conflict ended. A million voices woke responsive echoes to the glad tidings. The little army of Pythian Knights were among those who enthused over the affair, and felt that all power of discord had done its worst, and that the great and terrible conflict downward to the dark and dismal shades of desolation, and that friendship, charity, and benevolence had come to stay within the human souls, and thus restore the glory of the human race.

From those who have no connection with the Order, and who come to the question, "what is a Knight of Pythias?" He is to the uninitiated simply a member of a secret society, one of those organized for benevolent purposes, and is represented in most places by a lodge of the Order. To the student who studies history carefully, he is a representative of an Order based upon one of the grandest historical incidents ever recorded, the story of Damon and Pythias, which is known by most everybody.

Who today can help the feeling of joyous exultation pass through their bodies, causing them to resolve that in future years each will prove his friendship to his fellow man, believing that the love of a man for fellowman is the surest test of love of God.

To be a loyal Knight there is a far more significant meaning in the term, a Pythian Knight. A true Pythian Knight does not look at the ritualistic work as a mere form of an evening's enjoyment. He does not accept the assurance that he will not be called upon to offer his life to save a friend. A true Knight does no man wrong, but as he learns the history of selfishness and cruel wrongs with which the earth has been cursed, he feels the need of his being bound in the bonds of fraternal love to protect the principles of Knighthood until death. He feels that no grander objects were ever placed within the keeping of man, and none which when secured would more promote the happiness of man, than those laid down for the purposes and objects of a Pythian Knight.

The Pythian obligations and laws impose an imperative command "to protect the weak; defend the right; alleviate the suffering of a brother; watch the sick; bury the dead; care for the widows; educate the orphans; practice those ennobling virtues, friendship, charity

and benevolence. Exercise charity toward offenders; construe words and deeds in their least unfavorable light, granting honesty of purpose and good intentions to others, and throwing the mantle of charity over the unfortunate or misguided; stop the circulation of slanders and rebuke the slanderer; defend even the most bitter enemy when unjustly assailed." These are the underlying principles for which the Order stands, and which it teaches its Knights to practice, and to make the attainment of those objects his principal aim in life.

"The Order takes account of the fact that man's social nature demands something besides mere formalities of social gatherings; something more lasting and intimate than mere acquaintances; something that will engage the virtue of his heart, call out the deepest sentiments of his mind, impart him with new interests in life, and open to him opportunities for sympathetic intercourse and beneficent service. What man needs is the society of those congenial to all that is true and best within him; the society of those who respond to the profoundest cravings of his heart, the highest aspirations of his soul. In the social nature of his life, his true freedom and element. He can speak out the deepest thoughts within him; can be true to his better self; can strengthen others and be strengthened. Instead of touching his fellow men on the overguarded outer rim, where all is more or less artificial and formal, interior life goes direct to the interior life, there to give and to take all that is best for mutual comfort and good of each.

The Order is an organized check on the growing selfishness of the times, and an unorganized opportunity for the development of mutual faith and good will as a ground for a more real, restful and beneficial social life. A better foundation no institution ever had. No greater surety for its future can be desired. It unites men by such solemn and honorable bonds that in all their mutual intercourse they are at liberty to act out unreservedly their real better selves, and to appeal for such criticism, council and help, as will best enable them to realize the noblest ends of their being. The stranger is made welcome at the fireside of any Knight. He realizes that his property, his honor, his life, are sacred and safe. He is free in the presence of his friend to speak out his thought, and be what he really is, a social being. Surely regarded simply in the light of a social need, Pythian Knighthood must touch a trust chord in every true, manly heart, and in time secure itself a Castle Hall in every community.

The members of Empire Lodge No. 19 intend holding a sort of reunion among themselves. The Third rank will be conferred upon twelve candidates, after which some addresses will be given by the Lodge Officers, and refreshments will be served.

NATIONALISTS AND THE CORONATION.

LONDON, Feb. 22—At a meeting of the Irish Parliamentary party, it was decided to abstain from participating in the Coronation ceremonies.

A statement was issued to the effect that the party greatly regretted that the time has not yet come when it would feel free to join the other representatives of the King's subject on that great occasion.

# REIGN OF TERROR IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 20—"Black Hand" gangs, defying police efforts to check their operations, renewed the reign of terror with torch and bomb every night for the past week, and early today made two daring attempts to wreck with dynamite. Every available detective in the Central Office has been sent out to round-up the Black Handers.

Two agents of the Blackmailing Society drove up in front of the house of Dr. Bartoli, a wealthy physician on East 106th Street, today, laid a bomb near the doctor's door, touched it off, and then fled in a carriage. The explosion caused a panic of one hundred girls in St. Cecilia's Convent. The doctor has been receiving "Black Hand" letters for some time.
