## May Locate Crude Oil Areas Further West

CALGARY, Dec. 18 (CP) - Drilling of dry holes does not mean Crude Oil will not be found further west in Turner Valley, declared Dr. E. B. Boatright of Houston, Texas, on the witness stand before the McGillivray Oil Commission today.

The Home-Millerville Well, 12 miles northeast of the Valley, had struck oil, he said, in arguing potential areas could not be confined to areas where wells are at present located.

Dr. Boatright, petroleum and natural gas engineer, came to the stand after examination of Stanley J. Davies, Calgary geologist retained by Royalite Oil Company to make a report on the valley, was concluded.

Dr. Boatright said the general acreage of the valley used by himself and Dr. T. A. Link, geologist for Imperial and Royalite Oil Companies, was approximately the same - between 28,000 acres and about 27,000 acres. Difference lay in defining the areas.

Applying his own methods of calculation to figures used by Mr. Davies, Dr. Boatright said he arrived at reserves of crude oil of 19,700 barrels an acre. The figures which he had used himself, said Dr. Boatright, totaled 17,000 barrels per acre reserves.

Mr. Davies, who questioned two crude oil areas as area "A" with 1,870 acres and another as area "B" with 1,085 acres. Dr. Boatright contended if area "A" had reserves of 6,556 barrels per acre as set by Mr. Davies, then on Mr. Davies' own figures, area "B" had reserves of approximately 40,000 barrels per acre.

Mr. Davies' figuring, Dr. Boatright said, led to the conclusion that in the two areas there was a reserve of about 54,000,000 barrels or approximately 20,000 barrels per acre.

Efforts of J. J. Frawley, K. C., Commission Counsel, to question Mr. Davies on costs of operation and revenue from the Royalite Oil Company pipe line from the valley to Calgary were unavailing when Mr. Davies said he had not sufficient knowledge about the pipe line.

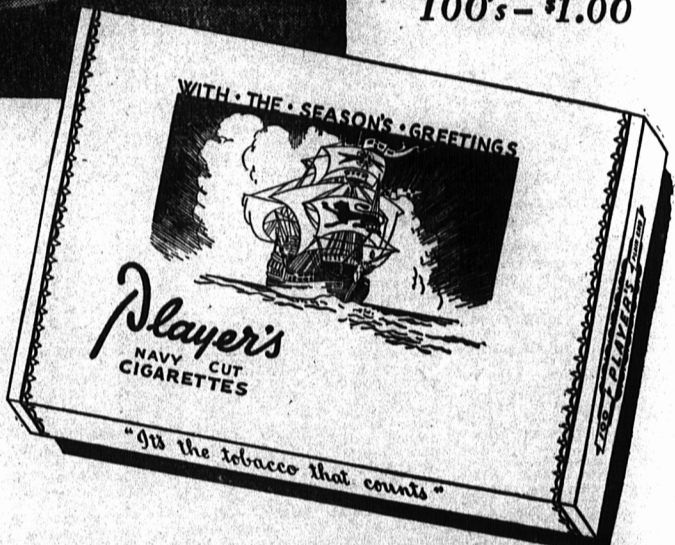

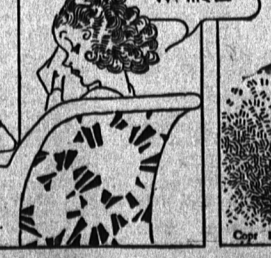
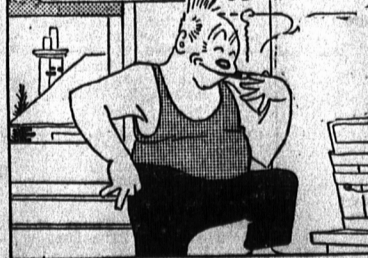
