### Dairy Meeting

The Murray Harbor North Dairying Co. held their annual meeting on Thursday, Jan. 21st. Inst., with a good attendance present.

In opening the meeting the president Mr. William McKay made reference to the good work done this past season and complimented the directors for the work that they had done to make this seasons work a success! The Secretary's report for the seasons work was then called for, the report of the seasons business was read and unanimously adopted.

The quantity of milk received during the season was 999,495 lbs from which was manufactured 84,436 lbs. cheese. The amount realized for cheese was \$17,502.09, and the average price paid to patrons for milk was \$1.55 per 100 lbs. There was an increase of 20 per cent in the output of cheese over the previous season. The patrons supplying the most milk for the season were William Graham, J. Riley, Charles Graham, William McKay, James A. McGee, James D. McKenzie. The following officers were then re-elected for the ensuing year, William McKay, President James P. Clow, Vice-President, William Graham, James A. McGee, J. D. McKenzie, William Condon, Charles Graham, Mathias Landrigan, Albert Graham, Directors: John A. Collings, Secretary, and salesman. A vote of thanks was unanimously tendered the cheese maker Russell Collings, for the good work done for the season in cheese making.
