This preliminary development included the putting down, over a wide area, of 62 holes having an average depth of approximately 250 feet, totalling in all 14,284 feet. In addition, 3,700 feet of trenching, 203 feet of sinking and 1,000 feet of drilling of the ore bodies. As its object the co-relating of the work was to acquire information on the geological conditions existing, it resulted in demonstrating an estimated ore tonnage of 36,857 tons having an average value of \$9.77 to the ton.
