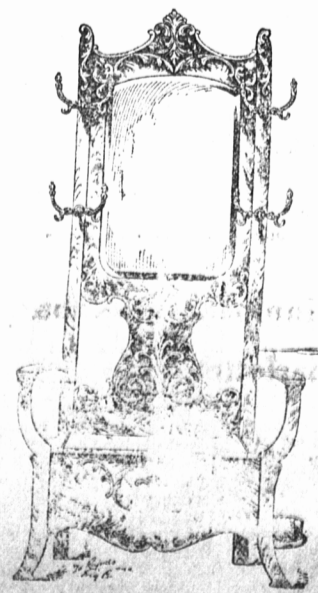

### MATTERS POLITICAL.

It is given out semi-officially in an Ottawa despatch to the Government papers that the general elections for the Canadian Parliament will not come off this year, and that the present members of the Commons will enjoy the privilege of another session, with its handsome indemnity of \$2500 each before being again called to the polls. We believe the announcement will be generally received with satisfaction by the country, and that this course of action is in the best interest of the Dominion at large. It is moreover desirable that the unrest which is always aroused by the near prospect of an election should be quieted. It is quite enough that business and social circles shall be disturbed when an election is really at hand, as is always the case at such times.

For that matter, there is certainly no need for an appeal to the people at the present time, and even if Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues were disposed to resort thereto as a strategic move, and with strong confidence of another favorable verdict, it would be somewhat difficult to find a sufficient pretext. The present House of Commons was elected in November, 1901 for a five years term, and less than three years of that term has yet expired. There is nothing in the present situation politically, financially or otherwise which renders an election necessary, and neither the politicians nor the thoughtful citizenship of the country desire an election at the present time.

These things being so we may look for a partial reconstruction of the Cabinet and the bringing on of the necessary by-elections in the not distant future. In this connection we note that Hon. Dr. Pugsley of Saint John, late Premier of the Province and now the liberal candidate in that constituency, will be appointed Minister of Railways. This view of the case seems to be foreshadowed by the Moncton Transcript, which had not been a warm supporter of Dr. Pugsley in the past, but now sees a great many points in his favor. The Transcript now sees no objection in the fact that Dr. Pugsley was not always a Liberal, and points to his commanding ability, his eminence as a lawyer and a public man together with the chance that "running as a Cabinet Minister he would undoubtedly carry the constituency of St. John."

The Opposition in St. John may not share the latter view, but it is none the less probable that Dr. Pugsley will be appointed to a Cabinet position before the by-election is brought on. The vacant seats in the Commons ought to be filled, some of them having been open too long already. London for instance, was not represented during the last session of Parliament and there can be no sufficient excuse for longer delay in filling the seat vacated by Mr. Hyman. When in Opposition the Liberal party laid down the dictum that all existing vacancies should be filled simultaneously, and we suppose this policy will be adhered to, as it certainly ought to be. We may therefore look for a number of by-elections to be brought on before the next session of Parliament, which will afford at least a ripple of political interest in the not distant future.

### NORTHWEST CROPS.

It seems now to be admitted that the crops of this year in the Northwest, especially in southern Manitoba and in

some other sections of the prairie country will come considerably short of the final yield of last year. The late spring is set down as a main cause, and one which adds uncertainty to the present outlook. There are fears that the not over abundant crop may not ripen in time to escape the early frosts. All this is regrettable enough, and we hope later reports may prove more favorable. In the meantime there is a wholesome lesson in the situation for those in the Eastern Provinces who are comfortably situated and yet have been seized with the western fever. The lesson, which is being repeated in not a few Maritime papers these days in the words "Stay at H. M."

#### A HOUSEKEEPER'S COMPLAINT.

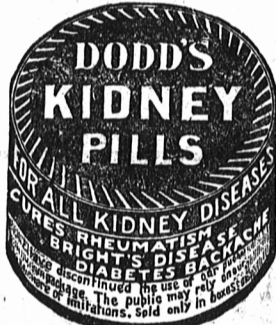
DEAR SIR,—I often wonder why the farmers' wives and daughters who sell berries in the market have no way of measuring them. On one corner of a table one sees a little mug holding about one half pint and selling for 10 cts. This would mean 40 cts per quart. Then we see a whole array of sugar bowls, cream jugs and kitchen utensils of various shapes and sizes, full of berries, but the seller does not know what they really hold, neither does the buyer.

In these times of high prices people should insist on market people using proper weights and measures, and do away with all such questionable practices. Not long ago, a gentleman bought one of these 'dishes' of strawberries and when he turned it into his basket he found a large rhubarb leaf doubled up in the bottom. This, the woman informed him, was "to keep the berries cool."

Country people as a rule are careful to see that they get all that is coming to them in the line of weights and measures from the shop keepers in town and should therefore remember the golden rule when the raspberries, &c. come, and bring them in crocks or buckets and bring a large spoon and a proper measure also.

They get the berries for the picking and should therefore give honest measure for a fair price.
