WAR MEMORIALS. The Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire in Saskatchewan propose to raise \$1200.00 annually towards establishing scholarships for post-graduate work in the United Kingdom or any part of the Empire. Conditions will be arranged between the Provincial Chapter of the Order and the University of Saskatchewan. Those scholarships are intended to be "commemorative of the unity and brotherhood, that heroism and sacrifices shown by our soldiers in this great war." "The Canadian Countryman," Toronto, thinks that there could be no more fitting memorial than the planting of trees in parks, streets, grounds about public buildings, churches and educational institutions, as well as about the homes of those who have given their lives. A native, hardy, long-lived tree should be chosen, such as the Sugar Maple, the Silver Maple, Elm, White of Red Oak. The City of Galt, Ont., has already decided upon this form of memorial. Australia is going to erect a memorial to each Australian division that fought in France, the sites chosen being in the war area of France. In England many suggestions have been made. One is that Trafalgar Square be re-made and beautified; another that the Thomas Embankment be completed by the addition of two or more miles of roadways, gardens and retaining wall. The most elaborate of the schemes is that known as the "Empire War Memorial," which will involve the rebuilding of half of Westminster at a cost of \$750,000,000.00, the ultimate aim being to create near the Abbey a centre and home for science, art and learning. The central feature of the plan is a fine Gothic building with memorial chapels and cloisters, the whole to serve as a great war shrine. New buildings for the University of London are also proposed, and the rebuilding of Lambeth Bridge would be necessary. The City of Ypres, by the request of Belgium, will remain for all time as the Germans have left it, as a memorial not only for Belgium but for all the Allies. In Newfoundland it has been suggested that a University for that Colony should be founded as a war memorial. Vincent P. Burke, Newfoundland's well known educationist, writing to the St. John's Telegram from the Teachers' College, Columbia University, New York, recalls that All Souls' College, Oxford, was founded in 1457 to commemorate the memory of Henry V and the soldiers who fell in the French wars. The University of Leyden commemorates the triumph and issue of the Siege of Leyden in 1574. He continues: "The year 1919 furnishes a golden opportunity for the cause of democracy. Newfoundland has done its bit to open a new road to freedom. Our present task is to keep the road open. To achieve freedom is highly important, but to know what to do with it is equally so. "If we are to put into effective operation at home these ideals for which we have fought, a building consecrated to the purpose outlined, is indispensable. Such a building dedicated to the practice of these ideals for which our boys battled in the deep and dark and blue ocean, in the trenches of Gallipoli, the historic plains of Fland-
