London's Opera Under New Plan Of Management

LONDON, Dec. 7.—(By the Canadian Press)—A five fold pact has been entered into by the big opera interests in London for the co-ordination of the following: The Covent Garden Opera Syndicate Limited, Imperial League of Opera, Old Vic Theatre, Sadler's Wells Theatre and the British Broadcasting Corporation. The idea is to create a new organization to be known as the "National Opera Council," which will be mainly an instrument of patronage and will occupy itself with advancing the interests of various opera seasons in London and the provinces.

The official statement with reference to the agreement entered into by the five organizations for the formation of the National Opera Council says: "Its membership which number about 250 and include the most distinguished musical amateurs in every part of the country. The business of the Council will be conducted by a small working body of about two dozen of its members. "The Board of the Covent Garden Opera Syndicate has been enlarged to include representatives of the other Opera organizations mentioned above. The enlarged Syndicate Board will receive all sums payable by the Broadcasting Corporation and all funds raised by the League and by the Council and will decide how these funds shall be apportioned.

"Apart from the Covent Garden Opera Syndicate Limited, the Old Vic and Sadler's Wells will organize and manage their own seasons independently. Sir Thomas Beechman has joined the Board of the Covent Garden Opera Syndicate as artistic director, and in this capacity will act as artistic adviser to the Old Vic and Sadler's Wells Company.

"The working body of the National Opera Council will act in an advisory capacity to the enlarged Board of the Covent Garden Opera Syndicate."

Blue Laws Are In Vogue Here

MARION, Neb., Dec. 7.—(By the Canadian Press)—This community is watching the prohibition issue with intense interest because if throughout the country, Marion would still have its prohibition. A clause in every deed to property here decrees "intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold or otherwise disposed of as a beverage in any place or public resort or upon the premises."

Also, "billiard halls, gambling tables, and other places of questionable character" are prohibited forever in the phrasing of the deeds. The property reverts to the original owners if the clause is violated. Circumstances under which these phrases were included in property deeds came about in 1901 when Marion Powell of Lincoln and his partner Martin Nilsson owned the land on which the original townsite was laid out. Kansas was then a dry state. Nebraska was wet. Since Marion was one mile from the Kansas State line, there was possibility of the town being the logical location for a thriving liquor trade. But the prohibition clause was included in deeds by which title passed from the first owners.

FINAL SERVICES IN KNOX CHURCH

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Final services in historic Knox Presbyterian Church at Elgin and Alberta streets were held yesterday, being conducted by the minister, Rt. Rev. Dr. Robert Johnston, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Next Sunday services will be held in the Sunday School hall of the new church, now under construction at Elgin and Lisgar streets.

Before a large congregation at the morning service, Dr. Johnston preached on "In Remembrance," in which he emphasized the value of associations and recollections of hallowed things of the past. In the evening, Dr. Johnston delivered another forceful sermon. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed at both services.

Vivid recollections of the past were brought before the Sunday School at the final session in the old hall in the afternoon, when the present superintendent, Norman Fee, presided. Appropriate hymns were used and short addresses were given by former superintendents, John Shearer, S. J. Jarvis, W. A. Weir and F. A. McDermid. There will be no formal ceremony next Sunday for the services in the new building, the form of worship being as usual. The official opening ceremonies will be deferred until the church itself is dedicated next Spring.

French Visitor Enjoys Quebec

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—(By the Canadian Press)—"Everyone seems to have an auto and I seemed to have been the only human being who ever tramped your roads on two feet," Professor Raoul Blanchard head of the geography faculty of the University of Grenoble, France, told an audience here as he sketched impressions gathered while tramping through Quebec this autumn. "I have always loved tramping so I decided I should see more of the country foot." Prof. Blanchard said. "Along I plodded, but what excitement I caused! The children regarded me and my knapsack and my beret as a wonderful thing, albeit they were extremely polite—perhaps even too polite. I knocked at the door of a priest's home and he thought I must be a beggar for he offered me alms.

"The interest of the French speaking Canadian farmers in me and my dogs and, to them, weird habits was intense. I was bombarded with questions of all kinds—from the French attitude towards the war debt problem to the Provencal recipes for making wine—and I did my valiant best to answer all, even when enforced sketchiness.

"The houses and general style of architecture in the rural sections surprised me. I had thought to find them English. They are much like those at home and the resistance to Americanization is remarkable though by no means complete. I have been all over the United States west and the centre of Canada and all is identical, all is cut along the American pattern. I look upon it as having been inevitable—nothing intrinsically good nor intrinsically bad—just inevitable.

"But the child of my country—the Province of Quebec—remains Canadian of palpable French descent."

Black Horses To Show in Chicago

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—Dawes Breweries Limited, of Montreal, will make a bid for blue ribbon honors in the Percheron exhibit of the International Livestock Exposition here when the judging of the giants begins tomorrow, when they will display 12,000 pounds of dynamite might horseflesh dressed in formal black fur coats. In the Percheron stallion, 5 years or over, class, Delbert, Captivator, Leo Magnus and Rockwood Granite aggregating a total weight of approximately four tons, will work for honors. Delbert Likeness, sired by the mighty Delbert Captivator, will enter the 1sts competing with 15 other stallions in the Percheron stallion, two year olds and under, class. Mona-ch's Laet and four others will compete with the best of the United States offer in the Percheron, five stallions any age division, class.

The big fellows will not appear in harness in the horse show but loom as dangerous contenders to other equine giants for championship honors in the breed competitions. They are the only horse exhibits from Canada and on their second visit here.
